Ran Into Heavy Weather

The victim of a sudden squall on the Pacific ocean, the *Ida May* of Astoria, a gasoline schooner, with a damaged engine, broken pump, broken gasoline tanks and both masts gone, was towed into Coos harbor Tuesday night by the Nelson steamship *Rosalie Mahoney*. Rescue was effected Monday night off the coast from Eureka, Cal., after the crew of five men had several times escaped disaster, including a near collision with a passing schooner.

Sunday and Monday coming down the coast the crew of the *Ida May* had to keep the vessel afloat by hand pumping, but when they were off Eureka, the engine went dead and the boat lay helpless about six miles off shore. In a couple of hours though the steamer *Rosalie Mahoney* came along and towed it to Marshfield. The *Ida May* was not through her troubles even then, for the tow line broke three times.

Reedsport Lost, 10 to 7

One of the pleasing features of last Sunday's ball game here with Reedsport was the form Carl Gilbert showed in the box. Bill Zosel started the game and was going all right but his arm, which he strained the week before, began to weaken on him. "Gillie" went in in the fifth. He walked three men, and was touched for two singles, in the three innings he worked, but the opposition could do little with his benders.

Reedsport made four tallies in the third, a home run by J. Traylor, with two on being followed by a double and a single. In the fourth Zosel struck out three men, but sandwiched in between were two doubles and a couple of singles which netted three. That finished the visitors' scoring.

Coquille started out to win the game in the first inning. After B. Brown was out at first, Otto Davis smacked a single, took second on Patterson's error and scored on Fortier's double. Lefty Brown tripped to right, scoring Fortier, and himself came in when Squires doubled to left. Squires scored on H. Traylor's error of Gilbert's grounder. In the second Pulford and Davis scored on a walk, a fielder's choice, a hit batsman and one single.

Patterson gave it up early in this inning and Austin finished the game. Errors of judgment and in handling the ball on Reedsport's part, accompanied by a walk, two singles and a double, scored four more for Coquille in the third, and then they quit, not getting the semblance of a safety in the last three frames.

The game was called at the end of the seventh, so that the visitors might catch the evening train for home.

Nearly 200 people witnessed the game, the receipts being \$88.
