More Than \$68,000,000 Surplus

"The fiscal year is just about to
close," says a recent Washington
press dispatch. "The Treasury last
autumn estimated that the Govern-
ment's expenses would be \$3,962,277,
407; that there would be a surplus
of \$68,000,000 at the end of this year
and of \$373,000,000 at the end of the
next fiscal year. There have been
unforeseen expenditures, but in spite

of this the estimate of a surplus will
be exceeded, Treasury officials have
said."

Gooseberry Disease Treatment

Anthracnose disease of gooseberries
is indicated by the presence of many
small dark spots on the leaves that
often cause the leaves to drop. Her-
bicides applied in 4-4-20 strength three
times to both surfaces of the leaves
is the remedy found effective by the
Oregon experiment station. Direc-
tions for making and using the spray
may be had on application to the ag-
ricultural college at Corvallis.

Peace Enforcement Pleases

The secretary of the North Bend
Chamber of Commerce is in receipt of
the following letter from Gov. Paine,
telling where he stands on some ques-
tions of public interest:

"I have received your letter of
June 17, together with copies of resolu-
tions passed at your meeting in
North Bend. I am delighted to know
that you endorse our general plan for
an additional cent on gasoline. It is
by all means the fairest and best
method of raising the money neces-
sary to complete our highway system
and will equitably distribute the load
resulting from the building of the
highways.

"Calling the legislature in extra-
ordinary session is another question.
I am very reluctant to do it.

"We are concentrating on the
Roseburg highway with tremendous
force this year. The highway com-
mission has promised me that all the
road will either be completed or
under contract in the southwest, in other
words, from Roseburg south, by the
end of my term as governor.

"It will also be completed or
under contract from Newport north.
There will be left only about 80 miles
which can be finished in two years
from present resources and the in-
creases that we can reasonably ex-
pect.

"I assure you that your state-
ments and resolutions will receive
my earnest consideration and that of
