Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the undersigned until the hour of five o'clock P. M. on the 13th day of July, 1925, and thereafter publicly opened at eight o'clock P. M. on the same day by the District School Board of School District No. 8, of Coos County, Oregon, at the First National Bank in the City of Coquille, Oregon, for an issue of coupon bearer bonds of said school district in the sum of \$10,500.00 in denominations of \$500.00 each, said bonds to be dated July 1, 1925, and to mature in numerical order as follows:

- Bonds numbered 1, 2, 3 and 4 shall mature July 1, 1928.
- Bonds numbered 5, 6, 7 and 8 shall mature July 1, 1929.
- Bonds numbered 9, 10, 11 and 12 shall mature July 1, 1930.
- Bonds numbered 13, 14, 15 and 16 shall mature July 1, 1931.
- Bonds numbered 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21 shall mature July 1, 1932.

Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed five and one-fourth per cent (5 1/4%) per annum, payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the office of the County Treasurer of Coos County, Oregon, or at the fiscal agency of the State of Oregon in the City and State of New York, at the option of the purchasers thereof.

Each bidder will be required in his bid to state the rate of interest which he expects said bonds to draw according to his bid.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish at his own expense suitably engraved bonds and the approving legal opinion of Messrs. Teal, Winfree, Johnson & McCulloch, of Portland, Oregon, or other opinion which shall be satisfactory to him.

The sale of these bonds shall be subject to the preferential right of the State Land Board of the State of Oregon to purchase same if not sold for more than par.

Bids must be unconditional except as stated herein and shall be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of \$500.00.

The Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids.
