Bay Men Developing Mine

Two hundred acres of mineral land near Powers, which tests have shown will yield gold bearing ore worth from \$3.22 to \$40 a ton, is now being developed by seven North Bend capitalists. Those interested in the enterprise are Dr. Phil Keiser, Fred Bynon, Edgar McDaniel, Bill Shrock, Frank B. Jackson, Harry Wenderoth and John Kaiser.

Jackson, head of the enterprise, estimates at least 1,000,000 tons of ore is available for use on the surface. Two men are now engaged in clearing the ground for mining operations and two more have been sent to the mine to start work on a tunnel. By driving a 60-foot tunnel through a hill, it is believed a rich vein of ore may be struck.

Jackson is now negotiating for a 20-ton Ball mill to be used in crushing the ore. With such a mill ore assaying at \$3 a ton may be profitably mined.

According to Jackson, no effort will be made to incorporate until the tunnel has been completed and the machinery for operation arrives.

The mine is located at the head of Salmon and Johnson creeks on Salmon mountain and about 15 miles from Powers. Placer mining was conducted there many years ago.—Daily News.

Bandon Plant Damaged

Recently while blasting on the state highway work in northern Curry county, the transmission lines of the Hydro-Electric department were blown down. In making the sudden connection with the ground—the "juice" kicked back into the plant and burned out the generator. It was necessary to take out the coils and ship them to Oakland, California, to be rewound. In the meantime the small generator used in the battery plant in the old woolen mill building has been installed and is producing up to its capacity. The Willow creek plant having recently been synchronized with the Mountain States Power company, current from both can now be used at the same time.

The accident has put the city to considerable expense both in cost of repairs and in cost of current that must be bought from the Mountain States plant until the big generator is back at its task. The hydro-electric department is preparing to file a claim with the state, believing that the state should pay for the damages sustained by the city through the state's employes.—Bandon World.

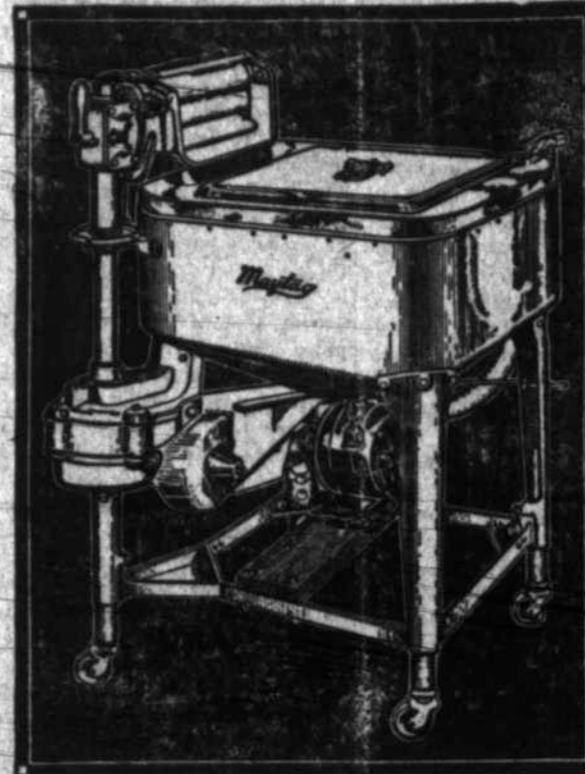
Arneson Begins on Sentence

A Brine Freezing Plant

The only brine freezing plant on the Pacific coast is operated at Gardiner, Ore; by the Umpqua Fish Storage & Supply company, of which George H. Richards is president. George and his brother Tom are at the Imperial. The Richards can take a silverside, souce it in the brine and in two hours it is frozen so stiff that it will keep indefinitely, and the tissue is not destroyed.

There is a good run of fish in the Umpqua, but Mr. Richards says that shad is particularly plentiful, being better than last year. He says he never has any trouble disposing of shad, although the average person doesn't know as much about this fish as he does about salmon. The brine freezer works well with venison. The meat is placed in an oiled paper bag and when it has been frozen—oh, boy! —Portland Oregonian.
