NOTICE OF WEED CONTROL DISTRICT

Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Coos County, Oregon, under Chapter 255 General Laws of Oregon, for 1923, has declared Coos County, as a whole, a weed control district for the purpose of destroying weeds and preventing the seeding and spread of Noxious Weeds and particularly declaring the Canada Thistle a Noxious Weed;

Section 4. "It shall be the duty of any person, firm or corporation owning or occupying land within said district to destroy or to prevent the seeding on said land or on the half of the highway adjoining said land, any noxious weed within the meaning of this act, in accordance with the declaration of the County Court and by the use of the best means at hand and within a time declared reasonable and set by the Court, except that no weed declared noxious shall be permitted to produce seed. Any person, firm or corporation owning or occupying land in said district violating any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be subject to a fine or not less than Twenty-five dollars (\$25) or more than fifty dollars (\$50) for the first offense, and not less than fifty dollars (\$50) or more than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for each subsequent offense."
