The complaint was lodged by Captain Nutter of the Coast Guards who saw a bottle of liquor in the car from which Mrs. Morgan had just alighted, and which was parked in front of the Gallier hotel. The man who drove the car has not been ascertained, but the car is registered under the name of H. W. Wigant, of Coquille. Authorities brought Mrs. Morgan to Bandon for a hearing Wednesday evening but upon a motion by District Attorney Bedingfield the case is to be continued and Mrs. Morgan has been released on her own recognizance.—World.
