Coast Road in Good Shape

Despite the dire predictions concerning dangers to a motorist over the Roosevelt highway made by a garageman in Crescent City, A. S. Benson, Portland lumberman, reported Monday that he found the road in good condition and much better than the Redwood highway from Crescent City to Grants Pass that is being recommended to motorists.

Benson, with his wife, motored over the Redwood highway from Grants Pass to Crescent City and while in Crescent City inquired as to the condition of the Roosevelt highway. He was informed that one literally took one's life in one's hands on that road and that even if the driver did survive the trip the automobile probably wouldn't. However, Benson returned safely, still looking for the terrible spots along the road that he had been told he would find.

While at Marshfield Mr. and Mrs. Benson visited with Earl Murphy, secretary of the Marshfield chamber of commerce, and suggested that action be taken to prevent maligning of the coast highway.—Bandon World
