Mr. Nessner, chief of the Geological survey, who was here recently, made a preliminary survey for a ditch to take the water from the East Fork to the North Fork for power purposes. The survey tapped the East Fork at the place or near where the river leaves the Ivan Laird place and follows a grade on the mountain side and across benches and goes over the Cheery creek mountain in the vicinity of the route of the old Coos Bay Wagon road, and finally into the North Fork above a proposed dam at Rock Prairie. This survey is to get at the feasibility of the plan. I am of the opinion that the people of the East Fork will emphatically object to any attempt to rob them of their river and their river scenery. For a dry river bed or one with only a trickle of water is not in the beautiful class. And what would the farms be worth with a dry river bed running through them, how would the loggers drive logs without water?

Perhaps the United States has a right to divert state water as it chooses and perhaps not. Last summer Marshfield and North Bend figured that they might drink up the East Fork by piping it to the Bay, but I fancy it will be a long time between drinks for them before they get it, for the people of the East Fork have the right of possession.

Coos County Coal

We find the following as special correspondence in the Christian Science Monitor under a Marshfield date line:

Coal mining in Coos county within the last few months has become very active. The mine at Southport, owned by A. H. Detlefsen is being developed to furnish coal for shipment, both by rail and water, and the Coquille Bituminous Coal Company has developed and blocked out several thousand tons in its two mines near Coquille.

The Coquille mine is preparing to supply outside markets as well as local ones. Coos county has 250 square miles of coal area, and for the past year and a half these two mines and one at Riverton were the only ones in operation. Coos county coal is lignite, but a fine domestic variety.

Injured High Climber Out

F. E. Brandon, high climber who fell 75 feet, over three weeks ago while working at South slough, was able to leave for his home in Powers Tuesday. His wife came down to meet him and he was able to leave the hospital on crutches.
