Remember Gun Club Dance

All those who enjoy the dance are reminded to keep open the date for next Saturday, Aug. 15, when the Coquille Rod & Gun Club will give a benefit dance in Graham's Hall.

From all over Coos county requests have been coming in for tickets for this affair and it promises to be one of the most largely attended since the opening night of Coquille's popular hall.

As previously stated the proceeds are to help defray the expenses of Coquille's representatives at the National Amateur Trapshoot in Dayton, Ohio, Aug. 23 and 24.

Messrs. J. W. Miller and E. D. Graham, who will be members of the Oregon five-man team, are thus praised by the Oregon Journal in its last Sunday's issue:

The greatest trapshooting team that ever went out from here to represent the state in any kind of a target event is that which the Portland Gun club is sending to the Grand American Handicap at Dayton, Ohio, August 24.

It will be Frank M. Trosh, John Miller, E. D. Graham, Frank Templeton, and O. N. Ford. Three alternates will go along too. They are Ben Treutman, Mark Rickard, of Corvallis, and Gladys Reid, of Portland.

This five-man team will be entered for the world's championship. Each state is entitled to send one or two teams but no more. This is the first time the team shoot has been held as a feature of the Grand American.

A purse of \$1250 will be given the four high guns as follows: First, \$500; second, \$375; third, \$250; fourth, \$125.

Miller and Graham, two of the mainstays of the team, are shooters from Coquille. That is quite some honor for the coast city.

Miller is one of the best shots in these parts. He is a 96 per cent shooter under any conditions. Graham is a 95 per cent shooter. Frank Trosh needs no introduction and Ford and Templeton are old heads at the trap game.

The entire party will leave here August 19, going direct to Dayton. Ford is the coast zone representative of Amateur Trapshooting association.
