Collision Off Cape Blanco
The Matson Line steamer Mauna Ala and the steamer Melville Dollar of the Dollar line were in collision off Cape Blanco at 6:15 o'clock Sunday morning, according to a radio message picked up along the coast.
Both vessels, although damaged, were said to be in no apparent danger and were proceeding on their ways. Neither of the two steamers carries passengers.
The Mauna Ala was en route from San Francisco to Honolulu by way of Puget Sound at the time of the collision. The Melville Dollar was proceeding from Seattle to San Francisco, her ultimate destination being New York.
The first named vessel was said to have three plates stove in on the port side above the water line. The Melville Dollar had a hole stove in on the port side above the water line.
The Mauna Ala is a steel steamer of 6805 gross tons and was built in 1919 at Bath, Me. She is 420 feet long, 54 feet beam, 31 feet deep and has 3000 horse power.
The Melville Dollar is a steel steamer of 7092 gross tons and was built at Shanghai, China, in 1921. She is 429 feet long, 55 feet beam, 25 feet deep and has a horse power of 3000—Bandon World.
