To Ship 20,000 Cases

The Myrtle Point American thinks the fruit-grower industry there is destined to get Myrtle Point on the map. Here is what the officer wrote after a visit to that institution last Saturday morning:

First thing worthy of note the grower of the fruit was a matter of "High Quality." It said the plant had one of a dozen or more pickers. Next E. L. Ingram of Rome was at the unloading platform with a Ford truck containing a thousand pounds of berries that had been picked on the place the day before. After weighing the berries, Mr. Glass took time to give out some information in regard to the picking industry here, the kinds of fruit picked and the field that is waiting there for berry and vegetable culture.

Mr. Glass has been with the local plant six years. First year he was here they picked a thousand cases of fruit. Last year 10,000 cases were picked and this year Mr. Glass expects the run will reach considerably over eighteen thousand, possibly twenty thousand. In the past the season was strawberries, logan berries, blackberries, plums, peaches and lemons, and a great quantity of miscellaneous fruit. The crop of which is usually heavy this season. The company had contracted for 25 acres of berries and they had out 22 acres of beds. Considerable work on the site was also done. Practically all the output of the company is sold to the Transcon, says Mr. Glass, and the entire output for this year has already been contracted for. The fruit is taken to Marshfield by truck and by boat from there to the California metropolis.

Mr. Glass stated comparatively little of the wild fruit in Coos county is utilized, because of the shortage of pickers. The berries grow along the streams where the bushes get sub-irrigation, and the crop every year is heavy. The local cannery will grow and utilize in proportion to the amount of fruit brought to it, which is to say that the cannery is only waiting for more pickers to make it a large and thriving institution. Such an institution means big pay-roll and big payrolls mean added value to every piece of property in the section.

J. O. Holt, the other member of the local company, is in charge of a company at Eugene that picked 200,000 cases of fruit last year. He is also manager for the Eugene Fruit Growers' Association.

"It is interesting to know that if the rate were 6% the heirs would have turned over to them in the year 2024, \$20,000,000,000.00 with a few odd hundred thousand dollars left over."

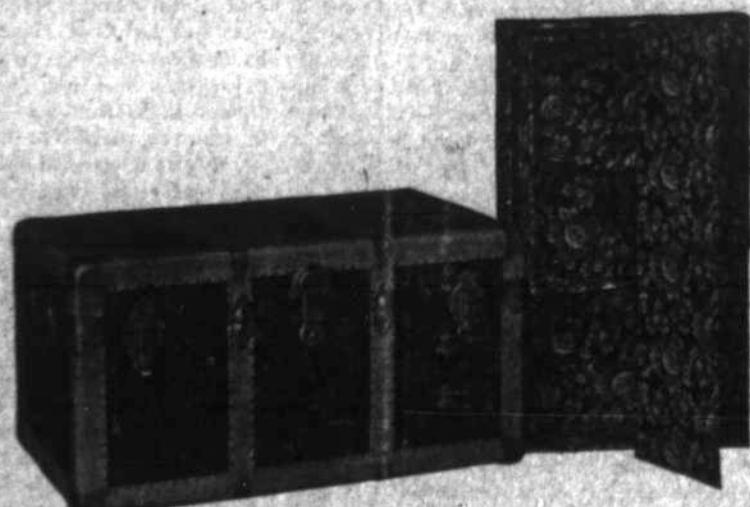
