For Railroad Consolidation

Senator Watson, chairman of the interstate commerce committee, conferred day before yesterday with President Coolidge at Swampscott. Both favor the consolidation of railroad systems, but want to see the railroads take that step voluntarily.

However, they are determined to force the issue if necessary, and Senator Watson will propose an amendment to the Esch-Cummings act at the next session providing for compulsory consolidation after a period of six or seven years.

Senator Watson after this interview said that tax reduction would hold the first place in the calendar following the necessary appropriation revenue measure would be adopted before March 15.
