Railroad Rumors

Ben C. Dey, general counsel of the Southern Pacific, will be in Marshfield for a conference with directors of the chamber of commerce on September 14, says the Marshfield News.

The purpose of Dey's visit has not been disclosed but it is believed that he will seek to have the chamber of commerce abandon agitation for the east-west railroad, project whereby the Union Pacific would enter this territory and the east be brought over 400 miles nearer Coos Bay by rail. The east-west project would run from Eugene through central and eastern Oregon, where there is now no railroad, to Ogden.

Hearing on the east-west project and on counter proposals of the Southern Pacific will be held before the interstate commerce commission in Portland on October 5.

It is not believed that Dey will ask the local chamber to entirely abandon the project but it is thought that he will seek the directors' support of a counter proposal of the Southern Pacific to build a line from Klamath Falls through northern California to connect with the established line to Ogden. Construction of this line would reduce the distance to the east by about 300 miles and if it is built it will virtually eliminate the east-west project.

The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce is now unalterably committed to the east-west project and indications are that its stand will not be changed.

These rumors must interest people in this valley, inasmuch as the entrance of the Union Pacific into this territory via Eugene would probably mean another railroad for Coquille.

Two Pairs in One Week

S. P. Buys on the Bay

A deed recorded at Coquille for a strip of land along Broadway in Marshfield, 315x94 feet, or less than one acre, cost the Southern Pacific \$24,500. The land is supposedly for a depot ground, but there is no statement of when or whether the depot will be constructed.

EAST FORK NOTES

To the question, "Where does the money come from to pay the service stations and the garages?" asked at Myrtle Point, Coquille and Marshfield, the replies were, from "Don't know," carrying an implication that many of the bills are paid on a jaw-bone basis, to "They pay for gas when they can't eat." Taking in the sights of Coquille one evening with Mr. Rose, we came up the street from the river past the picture show building at the corner. What struck me was the cars. How many there were I do not know but I do know they lined both sides of the street for nearly a block, if not quite to the First National Bank corner. Speaking with County Judge Mast about it, he said, "You probably saw \$50,000 on wheels. The automobile is becoming a problem."

A grocer in Marshfield put it this

way: the car expense is cutting into the necessities of life. Many people who have a thirty day credit instead of paying their regular bills, have had car trouble and part of those bills have to be carried over to next month and "next month" it would be new tires, which would put them further behind. He emphasized this: As long as cars were sold for cash it was straight business, but when they are put out for a little first payments and the balance monthly installments, the automobile business has become a burden, which legitimate business has to carry, and stated that people would even trade their homes or their equity in their homes—for which they were paying—for a car and then go to paying rent.

Before the road between Coquille and Bandon was made a "highway" there were boats on Coquille river. Now there is one little thing which leaves Coquille for Bandon in the morning and gets back at night. The freight which was formerly floated on water at \$2.50 a ton is now rolled on rubber at the same price and yet the automobile freight between Marshfield and Coquille, which by the sign board is the same distance, as between Bandon and Coquille, is \$4.00 a ton. Why this difference in automobile freight rate? The road from Coquille to Bandon parallels the Coquille river and the Marshfield-Coquille route has no water competition. Suppose the Coquille river would not be kept clear for traffic, would it affect the freight rates between Coquille and Bandon? If not why the \$4.00 per ton rate between Coquille and Marshfield?
