capacity as well as in his private affairs, there was never manifested by him any but purest of motives and a conscientious desire and effort on his part to deal fairly and honestly with his fellow man and to perform the duties of his office impartially, without fear or favor. When duty called, he knew not fear.

He was a man of unselfish devotion to his family and friends and to his duty as a citizen and an officer of the law.

He often discussed with me the plans he made for his children and family and was firmly convinced and endeavored to carry out the idea that a stricter discipline in the home and more careful training and closer association of parents with their children was the only solution for the epidemic of crime which seems to be sweeping the country; and his wife tells me that they often discussed this matter in their home and that Mr. Ellingsen frequently stated that if parents would do their full duty toward their children, the work of his office in running down criminals would be greatly decreased.

His last thoughts and words were not of himself but of his family first and last and of his friends and co-workers and among these later he mentioned especially his chief deputy, Mr. Sam Malehorn, whose years of faithful service he so highly appreciated.

On the journey through life, we each write upon the indelible pages of time a history of our work, an account of our achievements. When our book is closed by the grim reaper, nothing can be added thereto or taken therefrom. Our brother has written large and well. And were I gifted with the silver tongue of Demosthenes or could I soar to the oratorical heights of our own Daniel Webster, I could not alter one iota the page as writ by him.

It is well. In the short span allotted to him, he has inscribed in his book of life a record which we all might emulate with profit and of which his descendants may never be ashamed.

I feel that our brother lived and died as admonished by the great poet when he said:

"So live that when they summons comes to join
The innumerable caravan that moves
To that mysterious realm, where
each shall take

His chamber in the silent halls of death,
Thou go not like the quarry slave at night,
Scourged to his dungeon, but, sustained and soothed
By an unfaltering trust, approach thy grave
Like one who wraps the drapery of his couch
About him and lies down to pleasant dreams."

The pall bearers who bore the body of their departed brother to its final resting place were J. W. Laird, J. W. Miller, C. A. Gage, Lefe Compton, Arthur M. Fish and Geo. W. Bryant.

Interment was in the Masonic cemetery, where the Elks' service was concluded.

John Benoni Sweet

John Benoni Sweet was born December 15th, 1848, at Windsor, Nova Scotia and was the second son in a family of eight boys and three girls. There are still living in the vicinity of the old Acadian home five brothers and two sisters.

He spent his early life on the old farm, which is still operated by his brothers, and later as a young man went to sea, shipping before the mast on the sailing crafts of those days. He followed the sea seven years during which time he made many trips to Europe and South Atlantic ports.

In the year 1877, September 6th, he was married to Susan Gormley and six years later they crossed the continent to California, locating in the Eel River Valley, Humboldt county, where he cleared up and developed a valuable dairy ranch. Here the family resided about nineteen years until the farm, like many others of the Eel River bottom lands, was destroyed by the river.

In 1901 he moved his family to the Coquille Valley and purchased a farm at Lampa Creek. After running this place five years, Mr. Sweet sold the ranch to his boys and moved to Coquille, where Mrs. Sweet still resides.

Mr. Sweet met his death September 6th, he being instantly killed in an auto accident in which his son-in-law, E. P. Ellingsen, was also fatally injured. They were on the Roosevelt highway, where it crosses the Arizona Inn ranch, which is owned and operated by Arthur Sweet, one of his sons. His age was 76 years, 8 mos., 21 days.

John B. Sweet leaves to regret and miss his departure his widow now living in this city, and the following children: Alfred J. Sweet, who conducts a general store at Langlois, Oregon; W. J. Sweet, vice president of the Bank of Bandon; Arthur P. Sweet, who has the Arizona Inn, Curry county; Mrs. Pearl Ellingsen, wife of Edwin P. Ellingsen, sheriff of Coos county; Mrs. Maude Danielson, wife of Richard Danielson, who lives on their ranch near Parkersburg; Mrs. Jessie M. Treadgold, wife of M. E. Treadgold, manager Mason-Ehrman Company at Bandon; and Mrs. Harriet F. Mace, wife of Dr. C. O. Mace, of Pasadena, California.

Funeral services were conducted from the Ellingsen Chapel, Rev. J. S. Penix of the M. S. Church, officiating, and the body was laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery of this city.
