 Common Council will receive sealed  
 proposals or bids for the improve-  
 ment of Moulton Street from the  
 Fourth street bridge north for a dis-  
 tance of 266 feet, in accordance with  
 the plans, specifications and estimates  
 of the City Engineer of the City of  
 Coquille, filed in the office of the  
 City Recorder on the 9th day of  
 July, A. D. 1925, and pursuant to  
 the provisions of Ordinance No. 285  
 adopted by the Common Council on  
 the 8th day of September, A. D.,  
 1925, and the statutes of the State  
 of Oregon therein referred to, all of  
 which are hereby referred to and  
 made a part of this notice.

Said improvement to be at the  
 cost and expense of the property  
 benefited thereby.

Bids may be submitted for either  
 the whole work necessary to com-  
 plete the proposed improvement, or  
 for such subdivisions thereof as will  
 not materially conflict with the com-

She is an old and respected resi-  
 dent of this city, having lived in  
 this community for thirty-five years,  
 and leaves two children, Mattie Hul-  
 ling and G. E. Huling, the latter of  
 the firm of Huling, Lundy & Sons.

Funeral services will be held in  
 the Presbyterian church at 2 p. m.,  
 Friday, services to be conducted by  
 Elder Thomas Barklow, and interment  
 in the Myrtle Point cemetery—  
 M. P. American.

### Council Meeting Tuesday

Mayor Johnson and all councilmen,  
 except C. J. Fuhrman were present  
 for the regular meeting of the coun-  
 cil this week. The session was held  
 Tuesday evening, Monday being a  
 holiday.

The destruction of the old Moulton  
 street or T bridge, which had heretofore  
 been discussed in council ses-  
 sions, was ordered. The councilmen  
 felt that it was not safe and when  
 Frank Tension offered to tear down  
 the block of it, between Third and  
 Fourth, for the lumber he could salvage,  
 the council gave him authority to  
 do it. He will use the piling as  
 foundation for a couple of bungalows  
 he intends to erect north of the Bled-  
 soe House.

A gentleman named Wilson, who  
 had made a deal for the Oscar Nosler  
 lot, north of Richmond Hospital,  
 asked the council if the city would  
 relinquish its claim to the lot if he  
 paid the \$238 street improvement  
 taxes at the rate of \$50 a month. The  
 property had not been bonded for the  
 street work but to avoid having to  
 bid it in later the council agreed to  
 sell it on the terms submitted.

The grade on Moulton street, for  
 the block north of Spurgeon street  
 was established by ordinance and a  
 call for bids for improving the block  
 was ordered. The improvement will  
 run north 266 feet from Spurgeon, in  
 front of the Lee Goodman property.

The Lions Club resolution, ap-  
 proving the council's efforts in im-  
 proving Coquille streets—and get-  
 ways this year, was read and accept-  
 ed in the same co-operative spirit in  
 which it was written and submitted.

The marshal was instructed to no-  
 tify the property owners on Fourth  
 street to construct a new sidewalk  
 which the residents farther east have  
 built this summer. The old walk  
 down the hill from the J. T. Nosler  
 corner is worn out and the residents  
 of the Patterson Grove district have  
 built several hundred feet of walk  
 and were present to request that the  
 west 200 feet necessary be built at  
 once.

Payment of \$3231.80, final pay-  
 ment on the Second street improve-  
 ment made this summer, and \$4329.  
 50, partial payment on the Front and  
 Willard street improvement, was or-  
 dered made to the United Contract-  
 ing Co.

A week's leave of absence, from  
 Sept. 21 to 26, inclusive, was granted  
 Recorder Lawrence, who is going to  
 Portland to attend the Supreme  
 Grand Lodge sessions of the I. O. F.  
 on those dates.

### Dragged Himself for Miles

John C. Heddon, fire warden sta-  
 tioned at the old fish hatchery on the  
 North Fork, three to four miles  
 above the end of the road at the  
 Crump place, was in a dangerous situ-  
 ation last Saturday night.

It is a one man station, miles  
 from human habitation, with only a  
 slender wire to connect him with the  
 world. In the late afternoon his re-  
 volver carried in a holster on his  
 hip, was fired without any knowledge  
 on his part as to the cause. The bullet  
 entered his flesh, midway of the  
 thigh and ranged down to the lower  
 part of the calf without touching a  
 bone.

The accident happened three miles  
 from his cabin and he managed to  
 drag himself there. But he could  
 not make use of the telephone and it  
 was morning before he phoned to the  
 nearest neighbor.

Dr. Low was summoned and start-

 he will quickly recover, if blood pois-  
 oning, caused by the long wait, does  
 not set in.
