

Notice of City Budget

Notice is hereby given that the Budget Committee of the City of Coquille, a municipal corporation of Coos County, Oregon, did, at a meeting of said Committee held on the 15th day of September, 1925, prepare a budget and estimate of the total amount of money proposed to be expended by said City of Coquille for the next ensuing fiscal year of said City for all purposes, and which said estimates were, on said date filed in the office of the City Recorder of said City; and that the Common Council of said City has fixed Monday, the 2nd day of November, 1925, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P. M. as the time and the Council Chamber at the City Hall in said City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, as the place, at which such estimates may be discussed with the levying board of said City, to wit the Common Council of said City, at which said time and place any person who shall be subject to such tax levy when made, may be heard in favor of or against such tax levy or any part thereof.

Session of City Council
All members of the city council, except C. C. Farr, were present for the regular meeting of the city fathers last Monday.

The bid of Peart Bros., in the sum of \$334, for grading Moulton street north of Fourth, was laid over until next Monday evening.

The street commissioner was instructed to install a cedar drain box, 60 feet long, on the Elliott street approach to Sherwood Hill, in front of T. A. Walker's place to carry off the overflow during heavy rains.

Water Supt. Epperson reported that all property owners on Fourth street had agreed to build the sidewalk in front of their lots to connect with the elevated walk there which now ends in mid-air. It will furnish passage to residents of the Patterson Grove section of the city.

A petition to regulate and license show houses, peddlers, medicine shows and several other classes of business and signed by fifty or more business houses, was presented by Mr. Fuhrman and referred to the ordinance committee which will make a report on it next week.

The city budget for 1926, as prepared by the committee last month, was accepted by the council and Nov. 2 set as the date when a public hearing on it will be held.

N. C. Kelley and J. L. Stevers, on behalf of the Lions Club, presented a request that Tenth street, from the highway to the top of the grade in front of the high school, be gravelled from curb to curb. In wet weather the planks there are extremely slippery and a serious accident is imminent every time a car descends to the highway. The matter was referred to the street committee for a report.

Three Apply for Citizenship
Ernest Brower and Katrina Brower, husband and wife, of Marshfield, filed their declarations last Friday with the county clerk of intention to apply for citizenship papers. They are natives of Germany who came to the U. S. in June, 1910.

Fred Forest Dobbys, of Bunker Hill, filed a similar declaration on Saturday. He is 33 years of age, a merchant by occupation, and a native of Canada, who came to this county in November, 1922.

The T Bridge Serves Many
The fate of the T bridge which since the completion of the bridge connecting Spurgeon Hill with the highway, has been used for pedestrian traffic only, hangs in the balance.

Some weeks ago the council, on recommendation of the street committee, ordered its demolition.

But the destruction has been delayed and Monday evening J. E. Norton appeared before the council in the interest of many residents on the hill who use it, and asked that the council rescind its order.

In support of his plea, he stated that there are 125 people living over there, most of whom use the bridge more or less, to whom its obliteration would be a hardship. According to Mr. Norton's argument, the blocking of traffic on this short cut to the business section would cause a lessening in value of all property on the hill as well as of all business property west of Taylor street. He further stated that the bridge is not unsafe and for ten years more could accommodate the scores who use it daily.

He states that several residents of that section have volunteered to give a day's work toward erecting a hand rail on the bridge, which would eliminate any possible danger from its use.

Geo. H. Chaney, as chairman of the street committee, stated that his opinion was the same that it always had been, that the old structure was liable to cause the city a suit for damages, and that it was unsightly.

On the ground of its being an eyesore there is no argument, but Mr. Norton contends that the city has been remiss in caring for its appearance, that the blockades put up to forestall vehicular traffic have been crude and dangerous, and that there is no reason why a little money should not be spent there and this street kept open for foot passengers until such a time as the city's financial condition and the need to divert traffic from the highway rather than into it, will cause the city to erect another bridge from the Masonic Temple to a connection with the present Fourth street bridge.

No action toward rescinding their action was taken by the council Monday evening.
