Pheasant Season Opened

With the opening of the Chinese pheasant season at six o'clock yesterday morning the fields and eating places of the birds were jammed with hunters, most of whom got from one to four, notwithstanding the fog.

The first bird killed, according to all we can learn, was by Lans Leneve who hit his first one at 6:02. By 7:30 he had gotten the limit of four and was back home. He foxed some of the other hunters and planted himself at the foothills where he caught the birds scared up by those who started at the dike.

The one he brought into the Sentin-

el office was a big rooster and had the prettiest and most variegated coloring we ever saw on a bird.

Jim Laird also brought in the limit. Pete Miller scored three and Ira Johnson four, A. J. Sherwood four, M. J. Hartson and Geo. Lorenz each the limit.

The bag limit is four in one day or seven for the week. Shooting hours are the same as for ducks, half an hour before sunrise and until sunset.
