 younger set.

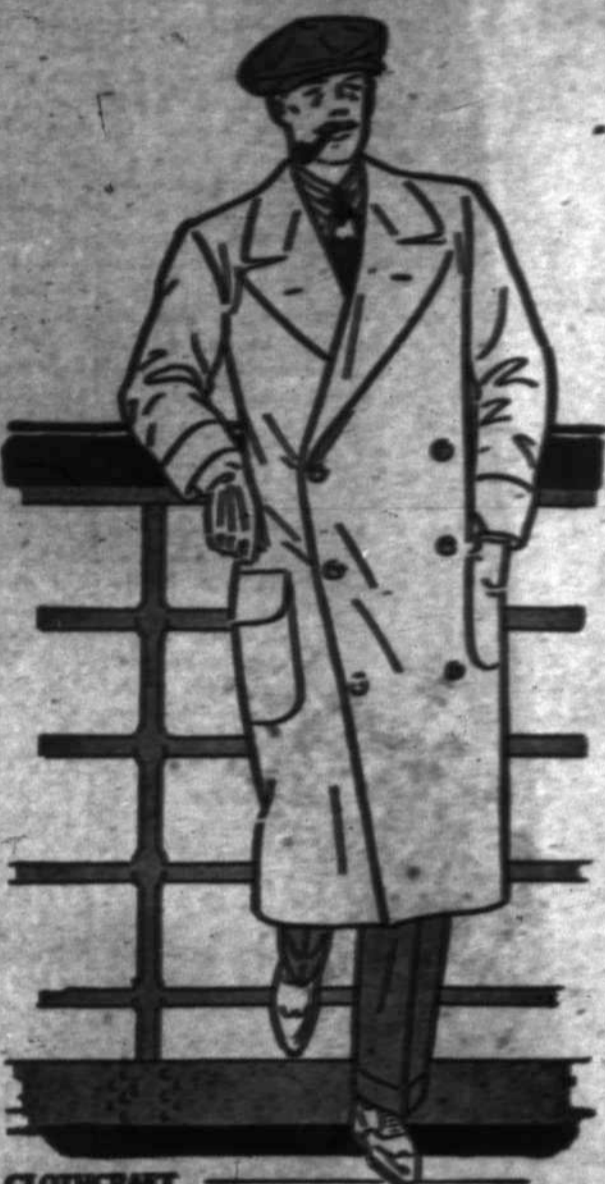
The groom is a young man of ex-
