**Marshfield Football Champs**

In a rough game last Friday, Coquille lost a 12-0 football decision to North Bend at the Bay and firmly entrenched itself in fourth place in the county conference.

The big game of the week was played at Myrtle Point the day following when the Marshfield team, accompanied by several hundred fans and fanettes met the smart and fast Myrtle Pointers. It was another of those exciting and well-played games which have been the rule rather than the exception in Coos county this year. Both teams played hard football and both made three touchdowns but Marshfield won 20-18 because she kicked two goals.

Myrtle Point has a fast team and played smarter football, but Marshfield had the power and any fair-minded spectator must admit the best team won. And Marshfield had, what was a matter of conjecture before, the nerve and pep and vim to come through with a touchdown each time Myrtle Point made one.

When Bruce Noeler made his spectacular run in the last quarter, the kind you read of "Red" Grange making, but which most of us never saw before, and scored a touchdown, Marshfield came right back with a fighting spirit and on straight football, with a couple of passes, made another six point score and kicked the goal.

Bruce received the ball from the youngster who received the kickoff and ran nearly the whole length of the field.

It was as clear and snappy and fighting a game as has been seen this year, in this or any other conference.

Marshfield wins county championship this year for the first time since 1919.
