The play opens in the home of Anthony, Lord Crackenthorpe, an eccentric entomologist, who is very much interested in spiders and Peggy O'Mara. His mother and his uncle, Lady Crackenthorpe and Major Archie Phipps design a plan by which Jimmy Keppel on his return from India will "dazzle" Peggy and ruin her design on the Crackenthorpe title.

Mrs. O'Mara with her pronounced Irish brogue and ways, is also interested in trap door spiders and the Crackenthorpe title. Peggy the heroine of the play is a lovable, impulsive Irish girl who ignores all conventions and proprieties and is always doing the unexpected—hence the title, "All-of-a-Sudden-Peggy."
