### Cow Testing Report

The following is the report of the Coquille Valley Association for November:

770 cows tested during the month averaged 411.5 lb. milk and 22.63 lb. fat. 18 cows produced over 40 lbs. fat.

Lee Evans, of Bear Creek, owns the high average herd. His 8 head average 671 lb. milk and 39.53 lb. fat. W. E. Crow was second with an average of 602 lb. milk and 29.01 lb. fat for his 32 head herd.

The 8-cow herd owned by H. L. Hedley made an average of 559 lb. milk and 28.10 lb. fat.

The high purebred cow is Susy, producing 900 lbs. milk and 45.9 lb. fat owned by S. S. Reed. The high grade cow is Susy, producing 921 lb. milk and 54.3 lb. fat, owned by J. P. Devereux.

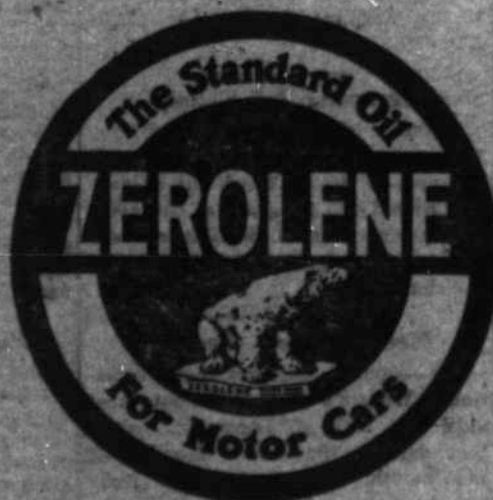
