M. E. Church Bazaar

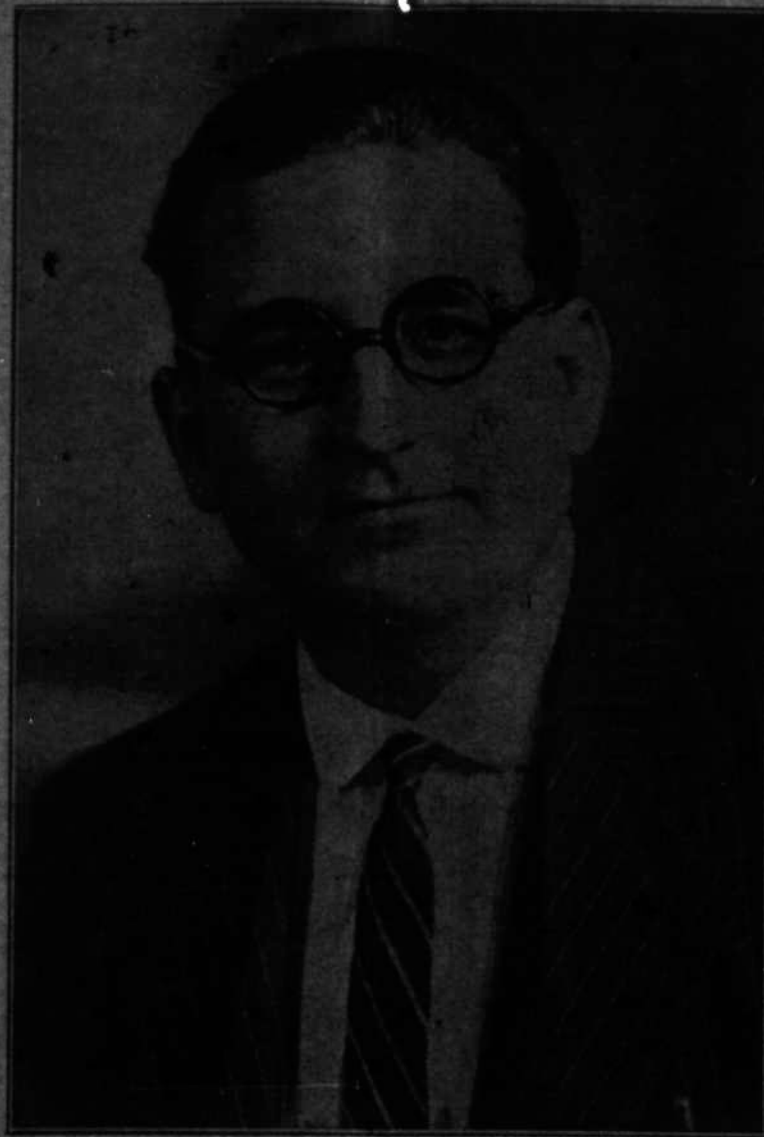

First Survey Since 1792

A radio fog signal was put in operation at Cape Blanco lighthouse Monday of this week, according to announcement made at Portland by the superintendent of the 17th light-house district. This, according to mariners, will make navigation along the local coast of Oregon less dangerous. Cape Blanco was considered one of the most neglected points of the Pacific coast and many ships are said to have gone down because of lack of adequate aids to navigation.

Just before the Rose City sailed from Portland for San Francisco, Captain Macginn said that much of the dangers attendant to Cape Blanco now have been removed. In addition to improvements in the light tower and the installation of a radio fog signal, the coast guard service has surveyed the waters and new and more accurate charts are available. Previous to this survey, according to Macginn, there only was one, made by Captain George Vancouver in the British sloop of war Chatam in 1792.—Bandon World.

Nearly \$5,000 for Beef Steer

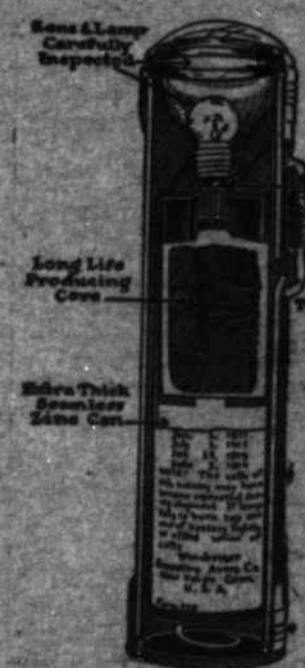
