### Died as Result of Fall

Maggie Bell, aged 69 years, who fell and broke a limb some weeks ago, died at the home of her brother, J. W. Bell, in the west edge of Myrtle Point, Friday afternoon, where she had made her home since her accident. Miss Bell has made her home with the S. Strong family for the past ten years and had made preparations to visit at her old home in Indiana. She was staying at the home of her brother, while the latter and his family made a trip to Idaho. Two hours after the brother and family arrived home Miss Bell fell on the door step at the Bell home and fractured her left limb above the knee. The brother stated the injury was the cause of her death.
