Federal Forest Road Funds

Allotment of Federal forest road funds amounting to \$25,000 which will be available next July was agreed on by C. H. Powell, district engineer of the United States bureau of public roads, and the Oregon state highway commissioner Wednesday at the Portland meeting.

The apportionment of these funds was as follows:

Eaches creek, Curry county, Roosevelt coast highway surfacing, \$10,000
Cascadia section, Benton highway, Linn county, \$40,000

Burns-Corvallis city road, Harney county, \$71,000.

Crocker Lake entrance connection with The Dallas-California highway, \$25,000.

Long creek-Beach creek, Grant county, \$50,000.

Wapinitia road, \$25,000.

Flores-Enterprise, Wallowa county six miles grading, \$25,000.

Widening of Mount Hood loop above Zig Zag, \$25,000.

The apportionment of funds for a connection between The Dallas-California highway and Crocker Lake road was made at the solicitation of Judge W. W. Sawyer, Bend. He also informed the commission the Shedd-Hixon Lumber company would be pleased to donate a tract of six acres to the state as a park. This tract is on The Dallas-California highway and includes the Lava river caves near Lava butte.

Deputy Sheriff in Explosion

Deputy Sheriff E. A. Malchen still looks the worse for wear as the result of a gas explosion last Friday when he and Deputy General were burning a still house and equipment. The still was located in a lumber section near the divide between Deak and South Sloughs, and the operators were living in a shack nearby. They were Geo. Duncan, of Bay City, and Roy George, recently from Chicago. They were arrested and were in custody of Sheriff Gage while the dynamite were destroying the shack still.

Malchen poured gas on the pile of stuff and it ignited from a lantern several feet away. The explosion lifted the roof off the shack and it is strange that Sam was not more seriously injured. His face, wrists and hands were badly burned. Mr. Duncan was also burned but not so seriously.

The two operators were lodged in jail.

Should Be an Universal Law

The first ordinance in America making it a misdemeanor for autoists to drive over a railroad crossing when a wigwag or other automatic device signals that a train is approaching will become effective in Contra Costa county, Calif., Dec. 10.

Following a series of fatal and costly accidents resulting from drivers' disregard of signals and warnings at crossings in the county, the board of supervisors unanimously passed the ordinance making such carelessness punishable by a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment in the county jail for a period not exceeding six months, or both.

Automobile clubs and railroads are watching with interest the effect the ordinance will have in discouraging drivers from beating trains to crossings.

Coolidge's Brevity

Giant Skeleton in Idaho

The skeleton of a giant man has been discovered 25 miles south and east of Boise, Idaho, in the lava fields. The skeleton is embedded in hardpan on top of a lava flow, eight feet under the surface of the ground. One of the teeth and part of the "ank" were brought to Boise.

To Drag River for Lost Girl

The sheriff's office at Roseburg was called upon Wednesday to aid residents of Sunshine valley, east of Roseburg, in dragging the river in search of Gertrude Gladwell, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Byron Gladwell.

The girl left early in the morning for school, a mile and a half from her home, and had not been seen since.

Assuming that she had met with an accident or had become lost, neighbors organized searching parties and it was decided to drag the river.

While preparations for dragging were being made Miss Gladwell turned up at the home of a neighbor and admitted playing "hokey" from school.

Old Fort Landmark in State of Maine

Fort Edgecomb is one of eight old forts purchased from the United States government by the state of Maine. The historical and sentimental value of their ruined blockhouses and grass-grown ramparts cannot be overestimated. Particularly is this true of old Fort Edgecomb, on the Damariscotta river, in southern Lincoln county, Maine, says the Dearborn Independent.

Moses Davis deeded the site of the fort to the United States government June 15, 1805. Here a fort was built for the protection of the Maine coast. Here were built extensive earthworks and a magazine of brick and stone. The Edgecomb blockhouse is a heavy, square-timbered structure of two stories, with a basement. The first story, 27 feet wide is pierced for musketry, commanding all approaches. Octagonal in shape, it still stands, showing the visitors the methods of construction of that day, the thickness of the walls, the wooden-peg construction, the size of the hinges bolted to the massive doors and the loopholes. The second story is 30 feet wide, 12-foot posted and pierced with heavy portholes and a covering of a man-of-war, having an overhang of about two feet, the whole being surmounted with a wooden tower, overlook or watch box, with an extensive view of the river, harbor and surrounding country.
