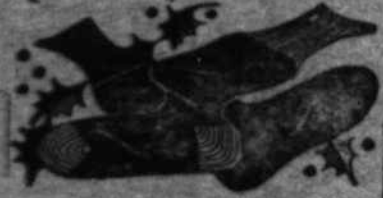

New Coach for U. of O.

The University of Oregon has signed a five-year contract with Capt. John J. McEwan to act as coach for the varsity football team. Capt. McEwan graduated from West Point in 1905, and for the last three years has coached the army squad at West Point, turning out three winning teams. He is to be paid a salary of \$2000 per annum, and has absolute authority in all matters pertaining to football.

Certificate or No License

With the first of the year only two weeks away and a third of Oregon's motorists unable to obtain automobile licenses until they have complied with the requirements of the new certificate of title law, police officials predict that more than usual confusion over licenses for motor cars will result.

A few months ago peace officers throughout the state agreed that they would enforce the license law the first of the year to obtain identification lists of car owners without delay. The Portland police committed themselves to such a policy and announced the customary period of grace would not be granted in 1926.

According to Secretary of State Kester about one-third of Oregon's motorists have failed to comply with the certificate of title law and the state authorities refuse to issue 1926 licenses until the owners have these certificates. Police officials admit that if they attempted to rule one-third of the automobiles off the streets and highways because the owners had not complied with a law they would be undertaking a pretty big job.
