Was a Poor Game

If the Coquille High basket ball team proves such an "in and out" during the schedule season as it has during the practice games there is not much hope that a championship will come to Coquille this season.

After showing good form against Albany last Wednesday the boys played Corvallis Saturday night and took the short end of a 12 to 9 score.

The boys were clear off their game. The dropping of the ball so frequently is likely to happen to any quintet at any time, but the lack of team work was the most lamentable part of their showing.

Team work and not the outstanding stellar work of a single individual is absolutely necessary to the winning of games. Grandstanding may put one player in the limelight but team work is the sine qua non of athletics.

The most spectacular player on the floor Saturday night was a tall youngster from Corvallis, who had lost one hand at the wrist. He was faster, more accurate and a better guard than most high school players who have two hands to use. He stopped in their tracks the speediest players on the Coquille five, and his passing was superb.

A few Coquille students showed poor sportsmanship Saturday night when they "bood" their own team for its "sorry" showing. Such spirit does not give a team the support it deserves.

Death of Mrs. J. W. Haines

Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Farr returned Tuesday evening from Eugene where her mother, Mrs. J. W. Haines, passed away New Year's day. Mrs. Haines was a resident of Coquille for several months a few years ago and was known to many people here.

Mrs. J. W. Haines passed away January 1st at her home in Eugene, Oregon, at the age of 61 years, 7 months and 14 days.

Mary Emma Fielding was born near Joliet, Illinois, in 1864. She was of English parentage, her father and mother both coming to the U. S. from Manchester, England, in their youth. Her early life was spent in Illinois. In 1884 she was united in marriage to J. W. Haines and to this union ten children were born, seven of whom are living.

In 1893 Mr. and Mrs. Haines and two children came West and settled on a farm near Pullman, Wash. Five years ago they sold the farm and since then have lived at Eugene. She was a member of the Church of Christ for 42 years and was an earnest and faithful worker, always doing her part as long as health permitted. She was a wonderful example of Christian faith and was one of God's good mothers.

Besides her husband she is survived by the following children, all of whom were present at her passing, except Mrs. Newhouse, who was unable to come: Mrs. Chester C. Farr, Coquille, Ore.; Mrs. Chas. T. Holley, Tacoma, Wash.; Mrs. Chad C. Newhouse, Portland, Ore.; and Eva, Wesley, Lois and Doris Haines, all of Eugene.

She was laid to rest in the new I. O. O. F. cemetery, Eugene, Rev. Mr. Stivers, of the First Christian Church, conducting the services.

Venus Visible in Daylight

The planet Venus achieved its greatest brilliancy on January 3 and due to that fact and that the weather has been clear, has been plainly visible in broad daylight.

Provided the weather remains clear, the star should be discernible almost due south and at an elevation of about 35 degrees above the southern horizon at about 3 p. m.

A small telescope or powerful field glass will show Venus to be a tiny half moon. On March 14 it will be seen again at its greatest brilliancy but as a morning star. Next to the sun and moon it is the brightest celestial object and from remotest antiquity has been the fabled morning and evening star of story.
