Seven months ago, Mrs. Shreve said, her husband, a cook, left her and their children in Portland and started for San Francisco with \$2 in his pocket. She heard from him a few times and then there was no more news so she started walking.

Mrs. Shreve told the matron at the city prison that she started with 35 cents after leaving the children with friends. Except for occasional automobile "lifts" she made the journey on foot, sleeping most nights in jails where she applied for shelter.

The woman soon found her husband in San Francisco, but he was penniless as well as she; but the publicity given to their case by the press has doubtless resulted in their finding work by this time.

Paints 4 Hours Under Water

Tilden Dakin, reputed to be the greatest living painter of outdoor scenery, is to visit Oregon the next few weeks to paint the beauties of the Rogue river and eastern Oregon scenes, he has announced at his home in Mill Valley, California.

Dakin plans to start at Grant's Pass and work down to Gold Beach, painting as he goes. He will then go to Bend to do other work. He will stop in Marshfield for a visit with friends.

Dakin first gained fame through his great painting, "The Valley of The Moon," which was the frontpiece of Jack London's book by that name on Oregon and California. He is also famous as painter of U. S. national parks.

He is noted as an explorer and painter where few persons go. He recently returned from a jaunt to the Bunta Banda Islands of Mexico where, in a specially constructed diving bell he painted marine gardens from 200 feet under water. The diving bell which he used was five feet square and on each of its four sides was a plate glass window, four inches in thickness.

He originated submarine painting several years ago in the Hawaiian Islands. At that time he would dive under the water and by a special contrivance was enabled to stay beneath the surface for about three and a half minutes. He would then come to the surface and paint from memory. In his diving bell he stayed under for four hours at a time.

More Railroad Rumors

Reports of a grand shake-up in the Southern Pacific organization whereby President Sproule and Vice President Shoup are to lose their official heads are contained in a sensational story published in the Klamath Falls Herald as coming out of San Francisco.

Sproule and Shoup have blundered in fighting the northern lines in Oregon, the story says, and the S. P. directors are to replace them with officials who will patch up differences with the Hill lines and end the Oregon controversy.

If this is true, the northern lines probably would be permitted to make their proposed extension from Eugene to Coos Bay without opposition.—Marshfield News.

Hurt on the Highway

Mrs. Gladys Dumond of North Bend, is in the Myrtle Point hospital suffering from a broken leg, broken thigh, and a broken rib as a result of an automobile somersaulting twice over a 40-foot embankment near Myrtle Point, Sunday afternoon. She was unconscious for twenty minutes.

Mrs. Dumond accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. John Todd, of North Bend, and George Redding, the driver, were nearing Myrtle Point when a car going in the opposite direction began skidding on loose gravel and crowded them over the bank.

Mrs. Dumond's five-months old baby was thrown out of the automobile into the mud which probably prevented serious injuries.

Mr. Redding received a badly cut hand and Mr. and Mrs. Todd were bruised and badly shaken up.

The automobile landed on the wheels but the top and windshield were demolished. One wheel was broken. The driver, said to have crowded them over the embankment, did not stop to give necessary aid.—Marshfield News.

Sues for Personal Injuries

Lloyd Grant, a logger in Coos county, filed suit in the federal district court against the Pacific States Lumber company for \$15,000 personal damages. He alleges that he was injured while working in the woods for the company near Powers October 13, when he was caught by a line and thrown heavily to the ground, suffering a fracture of the wrist. The wrist, he declares, has become permanently stiff and he is handicapped to the extent of the damages sought.
