Mrs. Graham Passes Away

Mrs. W. S. Graham, who had been an invalid for the past two years and confined to her bed for the greater part of that time, passed away Sunday evening at ten o'clock.

The funeral services were held at the Ellingson Chapel Tuesday afternoon, being conducted by Rev. M. F. Hill. Interment was in the Masonic cemetery.

Below we publish the account of her life as read by Mr. Hill, believing that it justly describes the sweetness, gentleness and faithfulness of her nature, as those in Coquille have known her for many years:

Olive Dunger Graham was born in Kerrville, Texas, June 18, 1882. She died in Coquille, Ore., Jan. 17, 1926, at 10 p. m. after a lingering illness of two years. She moved to Oregon with her family when she was but a small child.

On Sept. 13th, 1904, she married W. S. Graham, who with their daughter, Rena, survives her.

Other relatives are her father and step mother, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Dunger, of Coquille, and brothers and sisters, Frank Dunger, Mrs. Ada McClellan, and Alton Dunger, of Coquille; Mrs. Amy Willard, of Beaumont, Texas; Lester Dunger, of Scappoose, Oregon; and Mrs. Eunice Garrett, of Weed, California.

In Sept., 1911, she was converted and became a member of the United Brethren Church. Her life was marked by true Christian devotion and faithfulness, and while prevented by circumstances from taking part in many activities, her life was an inspiration to those who knew her.

During the illness of her mother-in-law, which lasted for 21 years, she was unceasing in her faithful attention. Her devotion to duty was such that personal considerations, the demands of pleasure or weariness could not call her from the bedside of the loved one needing her care. Such faithfulness recalls the love of Ruth to Naomi, and in her life testimony to the Master she followed and whose words she embroidered in her life:

"Inasmuch as you have done it unto the least of these my brethren you have done it unto me."

And when called from this world and its burdens and disappointment we have faith that to her have come the words full of comfort and peace: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of thy Lord."

Dies at Age of 84

Joseph Maiden, who died here at the home of his son, Albert Maiden, on Spurgeon Hill last Saturday, was buried on Tuesday in the Masonic cemetery, the funeral services, at his request, being strictly private.

Joseph Maiden, son of Geo. and Jaily Maiden, was born Oct. 17th, 1841, in Lawrence county, Indiana, and died in Coquille, Oregon, January 16th, 1926, making his age 84 years, three months and 30 days. His wife died in 1913.

Joseph Maiden was united in marriage Dec. 1st, 1861, at Fairhaven township to Maria Grant, daughter of Hamilton and Martha Grant, of Carroll county, Ill. Miss Grant being a first cousin of President Grant.

Eight children were born to this union; six of whom survive as follows: Mrs. Martha Lapham, of Seattle, Wash.; Mrs. Sarah Martin, also of Seattle, Wash.; F. M. Maiden, of Vulcan, Canada; Geo. E. Maiden, of Benson, Arizona and W. D. Maiden, who was in attendance through his father's late sickness, with Albert Maiden, at whose home Joseph Maiden lived in Coquille, Oregon.

One sister and two brothers also survive him: Mrs. Jaily Pickett, of Yankton, South Dakota; Alec Maiden, of Ayrshire, Iowa; and Chris Maiden, of Hillard, South Dakota.
