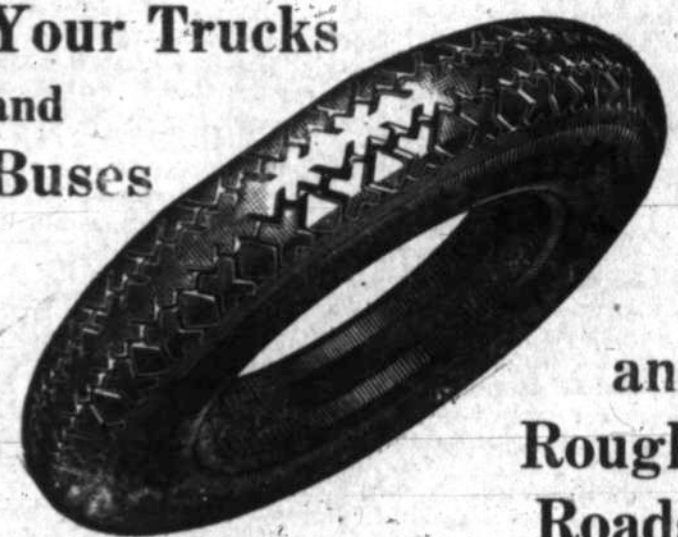

Rescuers

Four days of heroic struggle of the liner President Roosevelt to rescue the crew of the British freighter Antiope in mid-Atlantic ended in triumph. At midnight, last night, under a bright moon, thirteen remaining members of the crew of twenty-five were rescued from the freighter whose doom seemed imminent, says a New York press dispatch of yesterday.

Twelve men had been rescued late yesterday after the Roosevelt stood by the freighter more than seventy-two hours in one of the most savage storms ever encountered on the Atlantic.

The message from the Roosevelt said the rescuers took advantage of a lull in the storm, launched a life boat, and took off the remaining men from the Antiope. The freighter's crew was very weak and helpless, suffering from hunger, exposure and injuries, the message said, adding that the Antiope was still afloat last night, constituting a serious menace to navigation.

The Roosevelt has lost half of her ten lifeboats in saving the Antiope's crew, the frail crafts smashed by heavy seas.

Thirty ships are still in the storm area.

Found a Seven Foot Tusk

A huge tusk, thought to be of some pre-historic animal, was found by workmen engaged at Salem Wednesday in digging a sewer in an alley between Church and Cottage streets. The tusk measured seven feet in length and approximately nine inches in diameter at its thickest point. The tusk crumbled as it was being unearthed, but samples of the object were preserved and will be turned over to Morton Peck of the biological department of Willamette university.
