Preparations were made for a membership drive in Coquille during the month of February. The national objective for 1926 is 1,000,000 members, and the department of Oregon expects to have 12,000. W. C. T. U. Special Meeting

A special meeting of the W. C. T. U. was held at the Church of Christ, Wednesday, February 3rd. The meeting was opened with the song "Have Thine Own Way Lord." Mrs. Williams, county president, read the Scripture lesson followed by a prayer by Rev. J. S. Penix.

The meeting was turned over to Mrs. Unruh, Financial Secretary of the Childrens Farm Home at Corvallis. She urged that all stand together for prohibition, pointing out that even two working together could accomplish five times as much as each one working separately. The necessity and value of teaching temperance in the public schools was forcibly presented. The interest of the young people in the school can be aroused by essay contests on the dangers alcohol and narcotics, a prize being given for the best essay. Sent care for about one hundred and eleven children. They have five cottages, each sheltering from twenty to twenty-five children. One cottage was built by the W. C. T. U., two by appropriation by the Legislature, and two by the city of Portland. Another cottage is to be built soon and it is thought that Coos county can raise the \$16,000 necessary to build it.
