Barns Wrecked at Fairview

Two farmers at Fairview suffered heavy losses as a result of the storm which swept Southwestern Oregon last week.

The heavy wind struck the Roy Deadmond farm, known as the Moor place, and completely shattered a 40 by 60-foot barn, killing a cow, horse and hog. The total damage was listed at nearly \$1,200. The wind caused the barn to collapse but with the assistance of others Deadmond was able to save several head of stock buried under the wreckage.

Another barn a short distance away also was in the path of the wind and the entire roof was carried off. An automobile was badly smashed.

E. C. Crump, Deadmond's neighbor who resides nearby, reported that the wind also completely wrecked a barn on his property but no stock was in the barn at the time. His loss was placed at \$750.—News.

To Income Taxpayers

Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue, has mailed more than 40,000 federal income tax blanks to the smaller taxpayers of the state, covering earnings for the calendar year 1925. These forms must be filled out and filed in his office not later than March 15, accompanied by the payment of at least one-fourth of the amount of tax due. Those blanks can be used only by salaried people and wage earners whose net income for the year did not exceed \$5000.

Blanks for the use of individuals engaged in a business or profession or whose gross income was \$5000, or more, regardless of their net income, or whose net income was in excess of \$5000, are not obtainable at this time.

These blanks, as well as those required by corporations, will not be obtainable until the new revenue bill, which is now before a conference committee of the national congress, has finally been approved by both houses and signed by President Coolidge.

Under the provisions of the new revenue bill, returns must be filed by

1. Every single (unmarried) person, if unmarried throughout the year 1925, whose net income was \$1500, or more.

2. Every single (unmarried) person claiming exemption as head of a family, whose net income was \$1500, or more.

3. Every married person, if married throughout the year 1925, whose net income was \$3500, or more, during the year.

The exemptions allowed for dependents remains the same \$400 for each dependent under 18 years of age, or over 18 years of age if mentally and physically incapacitated.
