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In most cases abortion appears in high producing herds that have been pushed to top production, or in cows that are naturally heavy milkers. It is directly traceable to the lack of minerals in the feed which has caused a loss of vitality and a breakdown in the general health of the cow.

Picnickers Gather Flowers

Coos Bay motorists on their Sunday afternoon jaunts last Sunday turned out to be a wild flower gathering expedition in many instances and that night nearly every incoming automobile from the countryside was loaded with rhododendrons, azaleas, Irish Hawthorne, wood violets, daisies and other species of blossoms which make the Coos-Bay region a flower garden at this time of the year.
