That we wonder how many parents whose children go there have?
That we found everything inside as well as outside the building exceptionally neat and well kept.
That the rooms are attractive and we particularly admired the number of fine pictures in each but—
That we think we have never seen the stage so perfectly set for one of the school-house fire tragedies we read about but never think of seriously as happening in our own town.
That a building such as this one is—all of wood with oil-soaked floors—if it ever caught fire would burn like a bonfire.
That the front stairs leading from the second to the first floor are extremely narrow and steep and make two sharp turns with a landing at each turn.

That since they do not lead straight down from the upper hall nor straight toward the outer door in the lower hall it is necessary for the children to make four turns to get from the second floor out-doors.
That the back stairs are a little wider and have only one turn but the lower flight is almost dark.
That the stairs leading from the main floor out-doors are wide enough but that the door is only half the width of the stair.
That both stairs and door in the back are narrow.
That, of course, there are fire drills which are splendid but the children in this building are all small—none higher than the ninth grade we believe—and if one stumbles and falls on a crooked stair what then?
That to risk children's lives under these conditions is to pay too high a price for an education.

That we are neither a calamity howler nor a pessimist but we believe it better to face facts than to ignore them until something happens and then say "if we only had."

S. B. Cathcart 84 Years Old

S. B. Cathcart, civil war veteran, and perhaps one of the most widely known pioneers in Coos and Douglas counties, was receiving congratulations Wednesday on his 84th birthday. The night before friends of Mr. Cathcart gave a big birthday party in his honor. Mr. Cathcart states he was born in the home town of Tom Taggart, nationally known politician, in French Lick, Orange county, Indiana, April 21, 1842. He crossed the plains in '63, and first settled in Douglas county. He has been a resident of Coos Bay since 1872. Mr. Cathcart served with company A, First Oregon calvary.

The DAIRY

GROUND SOY BEANS
SUPERIOR FOR COW

In Indiana experiment station Bulletin 250, L. H. Fairchild and J. W. Wilbur report the results of three trials in which soy bean oil meal and linseed oil meal were compared as components of the grain mixture of dairy cows during lactation.

Three lots of cows were fed in two of the trials, receiving old process soy bean oil meal, with and without minerals during different periods, and linseed oil meal during a third period. In one trial two lots of cows were used, the feeding being for three periods by the double reversal method. New process soy bean oil meal was fed in this trial, and one of the lots received minerals.

The results of the three experiments were not entirely uniform, but in general old process soy bean oil meal was superior to the product prepared by the new process, and both were superior to linseed oil meal for milk production and in the grain requirements. Old process soy bean oil meal produced milk of a higher fat percentage than linseed oil meal, but the reverse occurred with the new process product. No definite effect was observed from the feeding of minerals.

The second part of the bulletin deals with the results of two experiments in which ground soy beans with and without minerals were compared with linseed oil meal for milk production.

The combined results of the two experiments indicated that the soy beans increased the milk production and maintained the fat percentage, as compared with the linseed oil meal. Less grain but more silage and hay were required for milk production with linseed oil meal. With the mineral supplements there was a decrease in milk production.

The authors conclude from the five experiments that soy bean oil meal and linseed oil meal are practically equal in value, while ground soy beans are superior to either.
