An annual hospital fee of \$15, entitling them to medical treatment, operations, and hospital service, is paid by citizens of Long view, Washington.

Hermann Leaves \$100,000

Binger Hermann's will was admitted to probate at Roseburg Tuesday and leaves an estate of approximately \$100,000 to the widow and children, except special bequests.

The Red Cross was given \$500. Some legal pleadings in Lincoln's handwriting, and a piece of napkin stained with Lincoln's blood, were among the articles divided among his sons and one brother in Myrtle Point.

The sum of \$100 was given to China Sam, an aged Chinaman who resided in Roseburg for 68 years, and who was once in Hermann's employ.

It is also directed that \$200 be paid for repairing and beautifying the Masonic cemetery, and a like sum for improving the cemetery where Hermann's parents are buried near Broad-bent.

Each of the grandchildren is given \$500 and great grandchildren, \$250. His sister, Otillie Bender, and brother, Frank P. Hermann, both of Myrtle Point, each awarded \$1,000 together with some personal and real property.

The widow receives all of the former congressman's stock in Capital Traction Company of Washington, D. C., and all mortgage notes secured by property in the District of Columbia.

All other property is divided equally among the children, except for a few articles of personal property divided between his sons and one brother in Myrtle Point.

Coos County Early Potatoes

A carload of new potatoes weighing 36,000 pounds was shipped from Coos Bay last week by the Pacific Fruit and Produce company for delivery in Eugene, Corvallis and Albany. This is the first carload shipped out of this section for many years.

Two-thirds of the supply was obtained from Coos River and the balance from the Arago farmers. The crop of potatoes is reported to be very good this year.

The shipment is the result of standard products. Under the state laws farmers must grade the potatoes and the purchaser now knows what quality of product he is buying.—News.
