Robin Reed Won in Two Falls

A very small crowd was in attendance at the Robin Reed-Victor Borg wrestling match last Friday evening, which the Corvallis man won in two straight falls in less than forty minutes of wrestling.

It was announced that Reed weighed 145 pounds and Borg 156, but to look at the two stripped for action, Borg might have outweighed him 20 or 25 pounds. And he looked big and husky enough to have broken Reed in two. But the latter is chain lightning and his ability to slip out of trouble helped him out innumerable times. He was over, behind, under and around Borg so rapidly that the bttler man could not ever get him located. Just why, though, he turned Reed lose on the few occasions he did get a hold on him it was impossible to fathom.

Reed won the first in 25 minutes with a body scissors and Borg was not long in patting the mat when Robin applied pressure.

The second went to Reed in nine minutes with an arm scissors and again the big boy patted the canvas in a hurry.

The preliminary between Ivan Gay, of Reedsport, and Odis Beckham, of Bandon, was as interesting as the main event. Both are very clever young wrestlers and they showed more scientific stuff than has appeared in most of the previous matches.

During the 30-minute contest, Beckham won the first fall in 17 1-2 minutes with a double leg split and Gay was the second with a toe-hold. Time was called before Beckham could get his opponent headlocked for the third fall.

New Franchise to Telephone Co.

The Coos and Curry Telephone Co. was granted a new franchise by the Marshfield council Monday night, the contract to be in effect for 40 years from the date of the passage of the ordinance and superseding the 1908 franchise granted the company. Construction of an underground conduit will begin at once running on Fourth street from Elrod to Central avenue and on Central avenue from Fourth to Third, the work to cost the company about \$4,000, according to the present plans.

This marks the fourth time that the ordinance has been presented to the council for passage. It gives the company the right to place, erect, and maintain poles, wires and other appliances and conductors and lay conduits, underground wires in and over the Marshfield streets, alleys, thoroughfares, etc. The ordinance as passed last night carries an emergency clause that puts it into effect immediately.

W. U. Douglas, attorney for the company, stated that the company intends to lay the Fourth street and Central avenue conduits before the proposed improving of Fourth street is accomplished. This piece of work is the only immediate substantial project outlined in the ordinance. From the conduit the city to be provided free of charge a duct for police, fire, and traffic signals.

Genevieve Chase Honored

A Eugene letter says: Genevieve Chase, of Coquille, was one of the 17 members of the senior class elected to Phi Beta Kappa, national honorary scholastic fraternity, in recognition of outstanding achievement. Including seven persons elected this fall, a total of 24 students have been chosen from the senior class this year, or eight per cent of a class of more than 300. Rules of the organization prevent election of more than 10 per cent of the seniors. Miss Chase, who is a major in the Romance language department, will be initiated Thursday May 6, when joint ceremonies will be held by Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi, honorary science fraternity.
