Senior Class Play Was Good

"Adam and Eva" presented by the senior class Friday, April 30, was a decided "hit." It was a three act comedy and brought forth many laughs from the full house that witnessed its performance. Briefly, it was the story of a wealthy man who, tiring of family life and wishing to be by himself, exchanged places with one of his employees and went to his rubber plantation while the young man acted as "father" in his home. The young man, as was to be expected, was not welcomed with open arms, and faced many difficulties before he finally brought about a change in the extravagant family by telling them that the business had failed, so that when Mr. King returned he found them all busily leading industrious lives.

The part of Eva, the leading role, was taken by Beryl Fish. As Mr. King's daughter she was just what she should have been. Beryl played the part very true to life and was as natural on the stage as though she was an old hand at the business of acting.

"Uncle Horace," who came for a week's visit and stayed for twenty years was John Seeley. As the only "man of the family, left" after the false failure he became a great success as an insurance agent. No one could have played the part, which brought forth so many laughs, better. The part of Mr. King was very aptly taken by Wayne Robinson. Wayne's interpretation of the tired and rather "explosive" business man was excellent.

Ralph Nash as "Adam," the man who took the place of Mr. King in his absence, was excellent. Even though he did wear "tie clips" Eva loved him so that it all ended happily. Ralph was as good a lover as he was a business man.

The parts of Mr. King's elder daughter, "Julie," who learned to "make cakes," and her husband, "Clinnie," who "would eat them, too," maybe, were taken with great success by Alma Oden and Clarence Bean. LeNorme Powder, who was to have taken the part of Clinnie, became ill two days before the play was given.

The part of "Aunt Abbie," Mr. King's sister who took memory lessons but forgot what she paid for them, was well played by Fern Houshelly.

"Dr. Delamater" and "Lord Andrew Gordon," effectively played by Harold Gould and Kenneth Simmons, were rejected suitors of Mr. King's daughter, Eva. Both did well, Harold as the doctor who prescribed a change for Mr. King, and Kenneth as the Scotch lord, "Don't you know."

Clara Brockman as "Corinthia" was all that a maid should be. She played the part very well and appeared perfectly at ease on the stage. The play was a success in more ways than one, however, as more than ninety dollars was cleared.

Select Best Layers by Use of Good Trap Nest

A good trap nest provides the one accurate method of determining exactly how many eggs a hen has laid in one year. There is no short cut or easy way to figure from part of a year's trap-nest record what the total for the year will be, nor to cull carefully enough to estimate what it has been or will be, say poultry specialists at the Kansas State Agricultural college.

The highest type of breeding for egg production may be secured only by trap-nesting every breeder throughout every day of her first laying year, and every day throughout the breeding season, as long as she is kept. In addition, both male and female birds must be selected which have the ability to transmit high production to their offspring.

The best poultry breeders are searching for the pullet that lays not only during the spring, but is also an early maturer and heavy winter layer, as well as a persistent summer layer. These characteristics, coupled with intensity of production, are found only in the best hens, the poultrymen claim.

Care of Breeding Stock Is of Great Importance

Apparently much of the trouble we have each year with poor incubator results is traceable to the condition which the breeding stock has been in for several months previous. A study of the results which some of our hatcheries are obtaining with eggs from different flocks hatched in the same machine indicate the great importance of this factor.

The hens should have plenty of grain in addition to the regular laying mash. Five per cent of linseed oil meal may be put in the mash to help the late molters in feathering. Green feed is particularly important to breeders. Do not use lights on the breeding stock.—O. C. Krum, Poultry Extension Specialist, Colorado Agricultural College.

Moonshiners and Others in Jail

The names of two moonshiners have been added to the docket of jail arrivals at the court house during the past week, both arrested by officers of the sheriff's force.

Delbert McBee was found operating a still last Friday in his home, five miles up Sandy creek from the Coos Bay Highway. When the officers walked up to the house Frank Osmond asked McBee, "Do you know who I am?"

"No, no," was the reply, "but I can guess." The officers found one still in the house where he was making a second run of 15 gallons of liquor, and a 60-gallon still was found about 60 feet from his front door, of which he denies ownership.

He was released Monday after Justice Stanley had approved his \$1500 bonds provided by his brother.

Ed Bryant was arrested on Salmon mountain Wednesday where he had a 12-gallon still, 50 gallons of mash, and 15 of liquor. Justice Kirby, at Powers, fixed his bonds at \$1500 and he is still in jail.

Harlow Christophson, of Roseburg, fined \$25 and costs by Justice Stanley for switching auto license plates. His car was held while he made a trip to Roseburg to secure the funds with which to pay his fine.

Clare Young, arrested at Bandon Friday, on warrant from Marion county, charging him with defrauding an inn keeper. A constable from Salco came after him this week.

Thos. Haraldsen, brought over Wednesday from North Bend to serve out a fine of \$100 imposed by Justice Maybee for careless driving.

Cause of Diseases

Most farm poultry houses lack effective means of removing moisture and impure air. Accumulated moisture in the poultry house and an overcrowded condition are directly responsible for the colds and roup which weaken the vitality of the birds, causing them to easily succumb to other diseases. To remedy this, use the open-front type of house, which has become universally adopted, and allow at least three square feet of floor space per bird.

Willow Wood Preferred
