Ed. Casey is seriously ill at the Mast hospital in Myrtle Point.

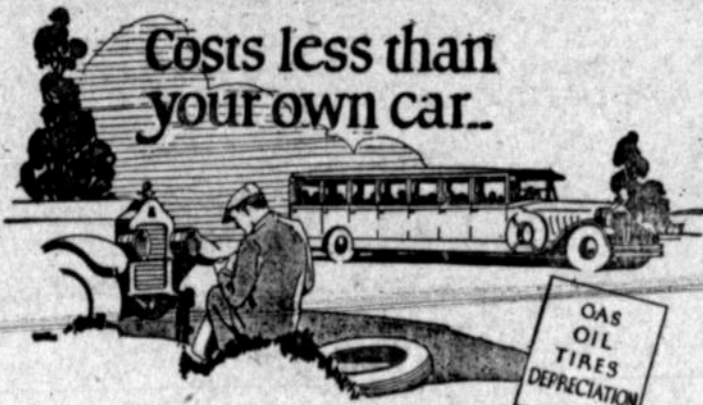

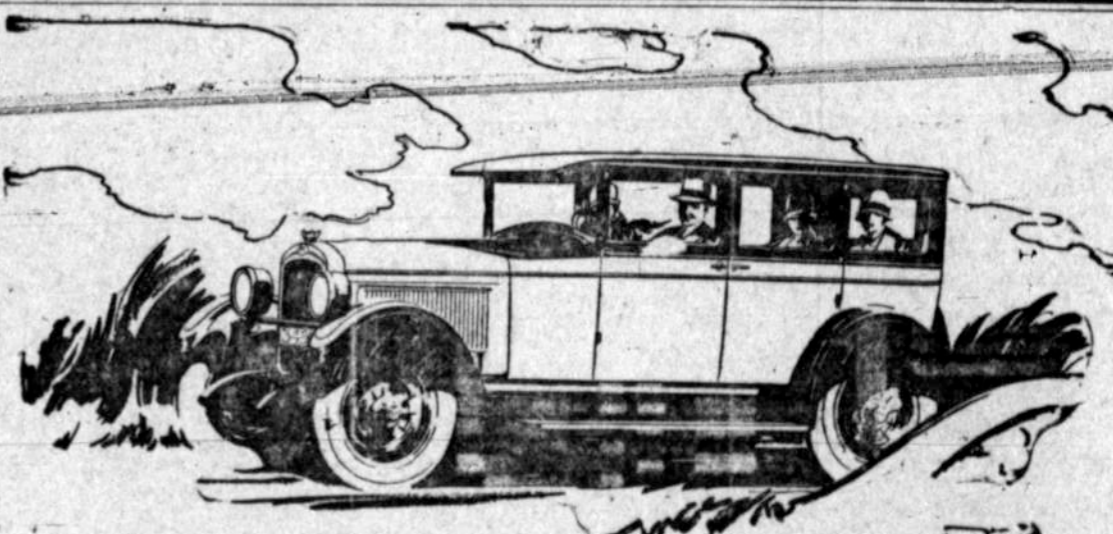
