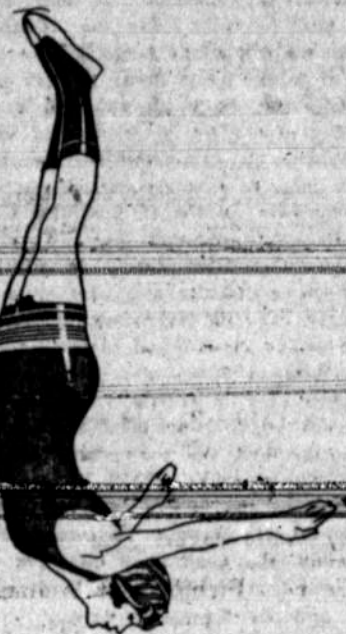

NOTICE TO BIDDERS

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council will receive sealed proposals or bids for the improvement of Coulter Street from the south boundary thereof on quarter section line in Sec. 1, Tp. 28 S. R. 13 west W. M., thence north to the south line of First Street, all within the corporate limits of the City of Coquille, a municipal corporation of Coos County, Oregon, in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer of the City of Coquille, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 17th day of May, A. D., 1926, and pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 278 adopted by the Common Council on the 17th day of May, A. D., 1926, and the statutes of the State of Oregon relating to the same, and which are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice.

Said improvement to be at the cost and expense of the property benefited thereby.

Bids may be submitted for either the whole work necessary to complete the proposed improvement, or for such subdivisions thereof as will not materially conflict with the completion of the remaining portion. Each bidder may submit proposals for two or more types of the proposed improvement as designated in the plans and specifications; but if more than one proposal is submitted, each should be distinct from the others and complete in itself but all may be enclosed in same envelope and but one certified check will be required, same to be security for such proposal as may be accepted. Forms of bids and contract and bond may be had upon application to the City Recorder.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids with or without cause.

Certified check in the sum of five per cent of the amount of bid must be submitted with bid, to be forfeited to the City of Coquille in the event that the bidder refuses to sign the contract and execute bond as provided in said Ordinance, said bond to be in the sum of fifty per cent of the total amount of the contract.

The work to be completed within sixty days from the date of awarding the contract, time being of the essence thereof.

Bids must be filed on or before the hour of eight o'clock, P. M., on the 21st day of June, A. D., 1926.

All bids must be made for a lump sum, accompanied by unit prices for the purpose of estimating additions or deductions made during the course of the work.
