COQUILLE WINS BEST GAME OF SEASON, 3-2

One Coquille fan told this writer that last Sunday's game here, between Marshfield and Coquille, was the best he had ever seen in Coos county.

It was a game that kept the fans on the anxious seat from the first ball Gilbert threw to start the game until "Ding" Mulligan lammed one into deep center, scoring Zosel with the winning run. Bill Fortier was right at Zosel's heels and scored too but that run doesn't count.

Coquille's murderous row was right after Fourtier, Marshfield pitcher, and the squad garnered ten hits although 13 of them fanned. Gilbert had an especially good day with only five hits off his delivery, eleven strike outs and but two walks.

Both teams played sparkling ball to entertain the crowd which filled both grandstand and bleachers and was seated in cars along the foul line.

Marshfield broke the ice in the seventh when an error gave Lonnie Frye a life. He stole second and came in on Burke's single.

Coquille forged ahead in its half. After Pulford had struck out, Gilbert singled but was caught at second on Bonney's infield tap. The latter stole second and scored on Zosel's single. Then Zosel scored on Fortier's clean hit.

Brundage scored the tying run in the ninth, after he had hit safely, advanced on Feightinger's out and scored on Roper's single. Marshfield did not threaten again.

In the eleventh Zosel and Fortier hit safely, and Fourtier walked "Lefty" Brown to get at Mulligan, filling the bases with none out. But "Ding" fooled him with that hard drive and the game was over.

Bandon easily defeated North Bend at the Bay, 9-2.

Baseball fans were here from all over the valley—Bandon, Myrtle Point and Powers—but only a corporal's guard was here from Marshfield to see the kind of ball that keeps the fans and fanettes enthused over the national pastime.

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Young At 60, Or Old At 40?

Dr. Decides

Women are as old or as young as their state of health. A woman may be young at sixty years or old at forty. It all depends on her physical well-being.

Youth and beauty have a foundation in sound health. And food is easily the most important item in health. In giving consideration to the subjects of diet and beauty, women should not forget the food essentials that make for the preservation of teeth, hair, figure and complexion.

Blame for round shoulders, flat chest and poor teeth among women is due in large measure to faulty diet, or, specifically, to a lack of lime and phosphorus. Milk, or evaporated milk, which is simply cow's milk with 60 per cent of the water taken away, is especially rich in lime.

Because of the concentration of evaporated milk, which is regulated by government standards, it is of



double the richness of ordinary market milk, as is shown in the following table:

A quart of milk a day for adults is recommended by doctors not only because of its high mineral content, but for the reasons that it helps keep the digestive tract in proper condition, strengthens the body to resist disease, and gives proper balance to the diet.

Salads also play an important part in the dietary. Some sort of a salad, lettuce, tomato, fresh fruit, cabbage or vegetable, should be eaten at least once a day. Neither is the daily menu complete without a generous quantity of coarse, leafy vegetables, valuable for their high vitamin content. Fruit juices also have very beneficial properties.
