Coquille Wins in Ninth

Coquille played an up-hill game at
 North Bend last Sunday and it was
 not until the first of the ninth that
 the game was won, the final score be-
 ing 10-7.

There was good ball and bad ball,
 but not the indifferent ball which the
 fans who went to Bandon said was
 served up there when Marshfield took
 the short end of a 13-1 score.

The hardest pill for the North
 Benders to swallow was in the second
 inning. With two down and three
 on, as the result of an error, a hit
 and a walk, Kendall poked one past
 Bill Wilson centerfield. It was good
 for a homer but young McDaniel cut
 third base a good yard and was called
 out. Yarborough, the North Bend
 umpire, made the decision, his at-
 tention being called to it by Bill For-
 tier. The Bay paper which said Ed
 Lorenz was favoring Coquille in
 counting out two of North Bend's
 scores, was mistaken, to put it as
 mildly as possible, for Ed had nothing
 to say on the play.

North Bend pounded Bill Zosel
 pretty hard in the first two frames,
 scoring three runs. "Ding" Mulligan
 took the hill top in the third, and al-
 though he was batted quite freely he
 held the North Benders to four scores
 in the last seven innings.

Coquille scored in the second when
 "Lefty" Brown tripped to right and
 crossed the pan when Kendall threw
 the ball away in an attempt to catch
 him at third.

In the third Mulligan tied the score
 at 4 all when he dropped one in the
 Bay, scoring Zosel and Fortier, who
 had got on through an error and a
 walk.

Three hits, one a double by Wils-
 on produced two more runs in the sixth.

With the brand of ball Amburn was
 pitching, things looked pretty blue
 for Coquille and the team started the
 ninth none too hopefully. Art Pul-
 ford fanned; then Harlo Call, who re-
 placed Royce Richmond in right,
 came through with a single. Amburn
 ascended about that time, walking
 Bonney and Zosel, and then forced in
 a run by hitting Fortier. Bonney and
 Zosel scored on Brown's long sacri-
 fice fly to right and Fortier crossed
 the rubber when Mulligan singled
 past second. Four runs on two hits.
 Not the best baseball in the world but
 it enabled Coquille to win and remain-
 ed tied with Bandon at two games
 won in the second half, or six won
 and five lost.
