About 35 years ago she united with the Christian Church at Coquille, and has always been a devoted Christian and a loving mother, having done many deeds of kindness for which she will long be remembered, loved by all who knew her.

Ella Hensley was married in 1872 in Sacramento, California, to Joseph E. Martin.

The deceased is survived by a sister, Mrs. Robert H. Blossom, of Berkeley, Calif., her husband, Joseph E. Martin, and four children—Archie E. Martin, Mrs. W. A. Bean, George A. Martin, and Clifford W. Martin, and one grand daughter, Dorothy Del Bean, all of Riverport.
