Moonshiners on East Fork

Armed with a search warrant, Deputy Sheriff Geo. Bohrer went to the home of Mrs. Belle Sell, at Holly and Bush streets, in the north part of town, last Sunday morning.

Upon entering he found Mrs. Sell getting breakfast and John Darling asleep in bed. She sat down on a trunk, when told what the officer wanted, so he began his search there. There was nothing in the trunk but alongside it were two half empty pint flasks of liquor. About 20 feet from the rear door of the house he found a gallon jug, full.

Both of them were placed under arrest and charged with possession of liquor and lewd cohabitation.

On Monday Darling was taken before Justice Stanley where he pleaded guilty to possession, but Mrs. Sell pleaded not guilty to the same charge. Her trial was held yesterday afternoon. She was found guilty, sentenced to three months in jail and fined \$300.

Darling was given two months and fined \$250 at the same time.

Her bond was fixed at \$500 in case she decides to appeal to the circuit court.

Neither one has had a hearing on the other charge.

Two Caught on Two Charges

Deputies Malehorn, Bohrer and Hunt arrested Reuben Cotton and Russell Jenkins Tuesday noon, on the Jim Cotton place, four miles above Gravel Ford on the East Fork, for operating a still. Two washboiler stills were also captured, and a little liquor.

The men started to run but were too well surrounded to get far. Cotton waived examination Wednesday and was bound over to the grand jury.

Jenkins demanded a hearing, claiming he had just gone with Cotton to get a drink, but Hunt testified that he had been on watch there since early morning and that Jenkins was the first man on the job and had started operations.

When Hunt gave his evidence yesterday morning, Justice Stanley bound Jenkins over also. The bail of each was fixed at \$1500.

A too friendly dog aided in the capture of the pair. The dog ran up to Hunt, sniffed around and left without even a growl. The constable was within 60 feet of the path used by the moonshiners.

Still Climbing

Expansion of the automobile industry along every line in Oregon is reflected in the statement of secretary of state Sam A. Koser, of registrations of motor vehicles in Oregon during June, 1926, and also for the half year ending June 30.

For example, motor vehicle registrations, including passenger cars, trucks, and motorcycles, were approximately 197,326 for the first six months of this year, while during the same period in 1925 they were 181,820; a gain for 1926 of 15,706. June of 1926, with 3,705 registrations, led the corresponding month of 1925 by 251.

Nation's Wealth in Homes
More than half the wealth of the United States is contained in the single item of real property, the land of the 48 states and the buildings which make up its cities, villages and farm communities.

The total wealth of the United States, exclusive of property owned by the government, is \$310,274,476,000, according to the census list. Of this real estate makes up a total of \$174,231,456,000. Tax exempt real estate property, including schools, churches, state and local public buildings, amounts to \$20,082,475,000. The 1925 tax rolls place a valuation of \$12,301,509,000 on the real estate within the confines of New York city, or about 4 per cent of the total national wealth of the United States.

Dog Saved Owner's Life

Henry B. Spencer, of Tacoma, credited his life to Rex, his nine-months-old bird dog, who proved his bravery in a hand-to-hand fight with a mother cougar and her three cubs. Mr. Spencer, who is mining in the Olympic mountains, was suddenly confronted with the animals. He was unarmed and the beasts showed fight. Spencer threw rocks at the mother cougar, but in doing so he lost his balance and fell. Before the enraged cougar could spring, Rex appeared and attacked one of the cubs. This distracted the mother, which turned on the dog. Spencer was able to retreat. The dog came through with only minor injuries.

Meals Served in Motor Bus

Passengers of a motor bus-line from Los Angeles to San Francisco are served with luncheon from a compact kitchen built as part of the vehicle. A button on the side of each chair summons the steward, who takes orders for either hot or cold dishes. The bus also has a special compartment for women, another for smoking and a third for the driver. The entire rear panel of the smokers' room is a plate glass window which permits unobstructed view of the scenery. Washroom space is also provided.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.
