Accident Near Camas

Jack Foster, aged 28, of Roseburg, is in the Coast hospital at Myrtle Point seriously injured as a result of an auto accident 27 miles east of there early Sunday morning, when the Chrysler sedan driven by Mrs. Roland Boyer, of Roseburg, rolled over an 85 foot embankment. Mrs. Boyer, 29, is also in the hospital getting treatment for minor injuries sustained. Roland Boyer, 32, was slightly bruised in the accident.

The accident occurred about 5 o'clock Sunday morning. There were only the three people in the car and they were headed toward Roseburg. That the occupants were not killed is considered a miracle.

Jack Foster is suffering with a crushed chest, concussion of the brain and other bruises about his head and body. His condition is serious, but it was said that he will recover if no complications set in. Mrs. Boyer is not in a serious condition. Myrtle Point Press dispatch.

A Lead Poisoning Victim

Arthur H. Hodgins, for eighteen years a member of the firm of Scaife and Hodgins, Marshfield painters, died last Sunday afternoon of lead poisoning and pneumonia, having been confined to his home the past two months, unable to work.

Mr. Hodgins, who was 59 years of age, first came to Coos Bay 36 years ago, and was well known in that section. His death came as a shock as friends did not realize he was in a serious condition.

The deceased was born at Ashland, Illinois. He is survived by his wife, Mae, and two children, George and Virginia, all of Marshfield.

Funeral services were held at the Ellingson-Groskopf chapel Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 conducted by the Christian Scientists.
