Beach Mining at Bandon

Interest in local beach and black sand mining is growing more intense as the summer advances. While plants of commercial size are under construction for the extraction of gold, platinum and other rare metals, attention is now being turned to the by-product, chrome, and, should an investigation now under way prove favorable, chrome may become the major item of consideration before the industry is well along, says the Bandon World.

R. M. Henningsen, consulting engineer of San Francisco and directing head of a large chrome extracting plant at Santa Cruz, California, made Hotel Westland his headquarters during the past week while prospecting and getting information concerning the local chrome deposits. Mr. Henningsen is one of a company of less than a dozen who are planning to

operate the three million dollar plant at Santa Cruz, where they are doing just what is proposed to do here providing the chrome is found in sufficient quantities and other things are favorable. It is understood that his company has a million dollars to invest if the opportunity in this line meets with their approval. The California plant handles 500 tons of sand per day and is said to be a good paying proposition.

The presence of chrome in the black sands of this section in large quantities is well established and during the past summer has been the motive of extensive prospecting on several claims in the Bullard section by Jack Meehan of San Francisco. The results of his activities have not been learned but from those in touch with the operations it is learned that the results have been satisfactory to Mr. Meehan.

Death of Amos Corson

Amos Corson died Saturday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Walter Donald, aged 77 years, one month and 23 days. The funeral was held at the Schroeder chapel Tuesday morning, service conducted by Elder Tommy Barklow, and burial was in Bandon.

Mr. Corson was born near Mount Sterling, Madison county, Ohio. In 1885 he married Caroline Keil at Minneapolis, Minnesota, and later they made their home in Walworth county, South Dakota. In 1896 they moved to Oregon and settled in Bandon. While the family lived there Mrs. Corson died, also their youngest son, Melvin.

Deceased leaves one daughter, Mrs. Donald, Myrtle Point; son, Roy Corson, Huntington Park, Calif.; one sister in Puyallup, Washington, and two brothers, Luther, at Kent, Washington and Abe at Bandon.—Myrtle Point American.

Of Interest to Berry Growers.

The Berry Growers Packing Company of Gresham is a going concern, according to its reports. During the past year its membership has increased 25 per cent and its volume of business is growing. Last year it handled two and a half million pounds of fruit, of which a million and a half were red raspberries. Loganberries, strawberries, blackberries, cherries and pears are handled and large quantities of the berries are barreled and frozen. Payments to growers last year totalled \$220,841.
