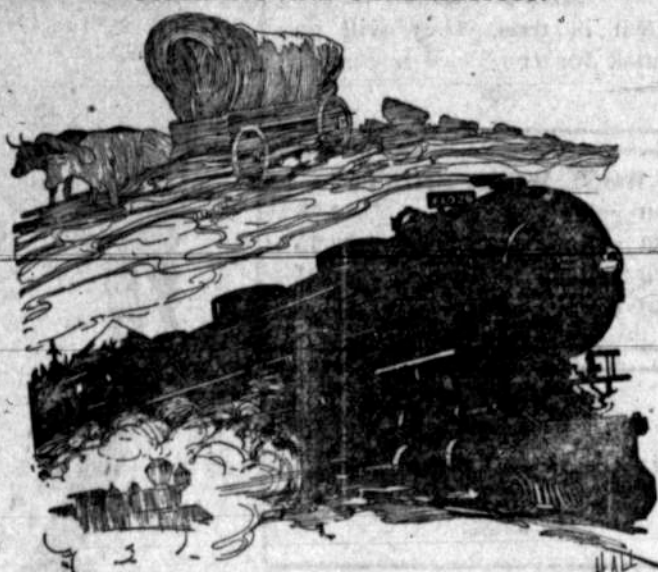

Menu at the Bay Tomorrow

Cooking school chefs who preside over alcohol lamp chafing dishes would probably have gasped in amazement at the menu for the American Legion state convention sea-food dinner, which will be treated to the visitors.

Here is part of what Mr. Cole has ordered to prepare the dinner for legionnaires and auxiliary members who will gather at Charleston bay jetty camp Saturday night:

One thousand pounds of Chinook salmon to be barbecued.
One thousand crabs, cracked and ready to eat.

One hundred pounds of salt.
One pound of bay leaves.

Twenty pounds of cube sugar.
One hundred pounds of butter.
Twenty gallons of dill pickles.
Sixty dozen eggs.

New Line Opens Aug. 20

Trains carrying delegations from Portland, Klamath Falls, Sacramento and San Francisco business and industrial organizations to the "Trail to Rail" celebration will be the first to operate over the Southern Pacific's new 280 mile Cascade Route. The event will unite eastern and western Oregon long separated by the Cascades barrier.

Though the regular local train service over the new line will not begin until about September 4, the railroad has arranged to run the first trains as specials to arrive at Eugene for the Trail to Rail celebration, August 19-20. Following the two day program and pageant they will travel over the new route to Klamath Falls. It is expected that more than 2,000 people will make the first trip which will carry them over the Cascades to the south Oregon metropolis.

World Record for Seven Months

Both mills of the Coos Bay Lumber company will close at noon Saturday in special tribute to the American Legion convention and to allow the employees to participate in the closing events of the gathering.

Both plants will resume operations Monday morning.

The big mill of the Coos Bay Lumber company established a new high average for seven months, being 588,000 feet per shift for the period ending August 1. This eclipses the production record of any mill in the world, it is said. On some shifts, the big mill has cut over 800,000 feet in eight hours.—Times.

Osmond Found Lot of Beer

Davis Thursday following a raid at 124 Golden avenue Wednesday night in which between 300 and 400 bottles of home made beer were seized and a small still. No moonshine was found. Mrs. Katherine Jones Harris, teacher of the Pistol river term of summer school, who taught last winter in Klamath county, was unanimously elected yesterday as county school superintendent of Curry county by the county court to succeed Mrs. Jennie M. B. Cope, resigned.

Mrs. Cope has been superintendent for almost six years and will leave in September for New York to enter Columbia university. — Gold Beach Reporter.

Diagram Showing How to Add a Stage of Radio Frequency to a Three-Tube Regenerative Set.

More distance, greater selectivity and an all-around better set may be had by using a stage of tuned radio frequency with three-tube regenerative sets of the type utilizing a variable tickler coil to secure feedback. Although intended for this special type of receiver, the tuned radio-frequency stage may be used to advantage with almost any receiver that is not neutralized.

Aside from increasing the distance and selectivity of the set, the extra stage will permit the use of a loop antenna—a highly desirable feature these days when stations are only 15 kilocycles apart and selectivity is an all-important thing. As the loop has directional properties, interference from man-made static can practically be eliminated by operating the set with the loop in such a position that it picks up a minimum of interference.

Aerial for Best Results.

With an aerial and ground the set will be found to be superior in some ways to many five-tube radio-frequency sets. The combination of tuned radio frequency and regeneration will make for better distance records.

The radio-frequency stage may be built in a small cabinet and placed alongside of the three-tube set.

A double-circuit jack has been placed across the secondary tuning condenser to receive the plug to which the two leads from the loop are attached. By using this method it only will be necessary to insert the plug to use the loop, the double-circuit jack automatically disconnecting the secondary coil.

The loop will be found excellent for use where it is impossible to erect an aerial. The set can be installed in an automobile or motor boat and operated in a few moments, as it only is necessary to connect the battery leads and insert the plug.
