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LIVELY VOLCANO ON UNCLE SAM'S DOMAIN

But Old Gentleman Cannot Control Mauna Loa.

It is one of the United States' own volcanoes, Mauna Loa, on the island of Hawaii, that is on a rampage in the mid-Pacific. Mauna Loa is almost ten thousand feet higher than the Italian Vesuvius and four thousand feet higher than the Sicilian Etna; were it not on a small and sparsely settled isle its present titanic display would have done greater damage and caused more serious concern throughout the world than it has.

However, it shot its columns of flames high into air, blanketed the Hawaiian landscape with great clouds of smoke and rolled its streams of lava down unpeopled slopes. The only witness, to its outbreak were passengers on an inter-island steamboat and a few frightened islanders. It buried beneath its river of molten fire one native village; it took no toll of human lives.

Mauna Loa has been an active volcano as long as man can remember it. In an island group of many volcanic mountains, it holds the distinguished place of being the highest volcano in the Pacific. It is only about five thousand feet less in altitude than the loftiest volcanic peaks of South America and only three thousand feet under the height of famous Popocatepetl of Mexico. Mauna Loa is in about the center of its island.

Within a radius of ten miles are the volcanic mountains of Mauna Kea

and Kusan, the extinct crater of Hualala and the almost constantly active and more famous Kilauea.

Mauna Loa's last previous serious outbreak was in 1885, when its flow of lava came within five miles of Hilo, the most important port of the island. Five years before was its most destructive outburst in the memory of the white inhabitants of the Hawaiian Islands. At that time it was feared that Hilo was doomed; the river of molten lava came within a half mile of the town and, according to native belief, was halted by the intercession of the Hawaiian goddess of the subterranean fires.

In 1916 the government did Mauna Loa a good turn by making it the principal attraction in a national reservation and including Kilauea and some minor peaks in its realm.—New York Sun.

Fruit Juices for Health

In England many people go on fruit juice diets for health and report amazing results. The juice of three or four oranges is heated by the addition of boiling water and the mixture is taken hot three times a day. After three or four days of this diet lemon, grape-fruit juices or sweet cider are substituted by way of variety. No side effects are noted.

During the first two or three days extreme hunger is felt, after which the fruit juices seem to satisfy all the cravings of the body for food. According to the reports from England, the fruit-juice diet has been maintained for 30 days with beneficial results, particularly in eliminating superfluous fat.—Thrill Magazine.

Big Panther Killed

An interesting and exciting panther hunt took place last Sunday morning on Hunter's Creek, a few miles above the mouth of the stream. Omer and Bob Miller, with their pack of hounds had gone out early that morning after camping out the night before and soon discovered the tracks of a panther, which was treed before it had run very far. Bob came back to Gold Beach to get Mr. Simmons, of Holly-wood, who is spending a few weeks at Gold Beach in search of hunting excitement and pictures. A hurried trip was made back to the scene of the fray, and after several camera shots had been taken, and the panther, a female teased until she was hopping mad, then was given a shot of lead that ended her life. The animal measured eight and one-half feet. Several weeks ago the Miller boys and Mr. Simmons killed a male panther in the Pistol River country that measured nine feet and three inches.—Gold Beach Reporter.

DAIRY

GRASS NOT ALWAYS SUFFICIENT FEED

Good pasture is always considered to be the most desirable ration for the dairy cow. Yet, in some cases, a heavy-producing cow may not be able to get enough food from grass alone. Pastures vary in capacity. One man's pasture may be knee deep in rich and luxuriant forage, while another's may be little better than a dry lot. It will depend greatly on the productive power of the pasture as to how much supplementary feed, if any, is needed. According to the department of farm management at Washington, a cow producing three gallons of milk a day on pasture should get approximately three pounds of grain additional or its equivalent in good hay or green feed. A cow producing four gallons of average milk should get about five pounds of grain, and for five gallons of milk of average quality, about eight pounds of grain.

This is just a business proposition. If a pound of grain fed to a certain cow will produce an extra pound or two of milk and the milk produced is worth more than the grain, it will pay to feed that much grain. If the cow will not produce enough more milk to pay for the grain she either does not need it or is not capable of increasing her production. Obviously, it will pay better to feed extra grain when milk and butter is at a good price than when it brings a low price. It must also be remembered that while extra feed may not increase the milk flow of the cow immediately, it may prevent her going down in milk later and may pay for itself that way.—Chas. I. Bray, Associate Professor of Animal Husbandry, Colorado Agricultural College.

Sure Way of Obtaining a High Yield of Milk

The surest way of obtaining a high yield of milk from a cow is to have her in good flesh at calving time. If a plentiful supply of good feed is given the cow, before calving, the animal will be in good condition, vigorous and healthy. The material that builds up the milk must come from some source, and if it is not supplied by liberal feeding, the cow will deny herself and use her own tissues and strength for producing her offspring. As a result when the calf is dropped the cow is weak and the calf is not as strong as it would have been if the mother had been on feed. The feed fed is used for building up the partly destroyed tissues and supplying milk for the calf.

Thus by supplying a liberal ration to the cow while carrying the unborn calf, a reserve of fats and other building materials is ready for the purpose of milking the calf, and the mother is not forced to use her own flesh and blood for this purpose. As a result, she will be more likely to drop a strong, vigorous calf, give her maximum milk production and she and the calf will be better off with no more feed used in the long run.

Practical Plan to Wean Young Calf Is Outlined

When a calf is to be weaned, after running with the cow for three or four months, shut the cow up at night for a week or ten days, milk her every morning and let her run with the calf through the day. Then, at the end of ten days, after the calf has run with the cow in the morning, say one hour, and the cow eats a little and gets a drink, shut her up and milk her in the evening. Then turn calf with cow for half an hour or so and shut up for the night. Repeat this for a week or ten days. By this time the calf will conclude the cow is about dry and will care little for her.

Put the calf weaner on the calf and let the cow and calf run together as at first. This does away with the cow and calf fretting for each other and makes it a much more agreeable job for the one doing the work.

Dairy Facts

Use no dry, dusty food just previous to milking.

The younger the scrub bull is the better beef he makes.

The scrub sire is a money loser from every standpoint.

Cream should be cooled in cold water immediately after separating in winter as well as in summer.

Success in the dairy business depends upon the cow and the man. If you are sure of yourself, then test the cows.

Raise calves only from the very best cows. Milking ability is inherited and inferior cows can produce only their kind.

Dairy cattle should be kept in a stable, preferably without cellar or storage loft, and where no other animals are housed.

Do not allow any strong flavored food, like garlic, cabbage, or turnips, to be eaten, except immediately after milking. Changes in feed should be made gradually.
