With the opening of the last link in the highway to Coos Bay, the traffic to Reedsport will grow rapidly and they claim the need for additional up-to-the-minute hotel accommodations will be great.

Mining Activity at Gold Beach

The Engineering Metals company shipped the last car load of concentrating tables to the Miller property at Gold Beach and preparations are nearing to start for the removal
