Letter from the Near East

Writing to the Sentinel from Athens, Greece, under date of Aug. 20, T. A. Swayze says:

Mrs. Swayze and I have now completed our journeys in Turkey, Syria, Palestine, Egypt and Greece, homes of ancient civilizations where modern children cry for bread and pray for a drink of cold water. Countries torn with strife from within or without until human suffering has reached the peak and populations moving to a new land overnight, unexpected and unwanted, create conditions beyond the imagination of any American who has not been here to see.

But the one bright star in a dark sky of distress has been the work of the Near East Relief. As Americans our hearts have filled with pride. We breathed a prayer of thanksgiving that we were citizens of a country that was in the business of saving human life rather than destroying it, of healing wounds instead of making them. This has been one of the finest pieces of work America has ever done. America is a magic word everywhere and some day this investment in friendship will pay dividends that we little dream of now.

To look into the bright faces of these thousands of boys and girls whom we have helped to save is a real inspiration. They are well and strong and happy. Many have learned trades and have gone out. If we continue our support a few years longer, the job will be completed and every child taken in will be turned out a well trained, self reliant citizen in lands that need their services and leadership so badly.

After seeing the work in most of its phases, living in the orphanages, talking with not only Near East Relief workers but many other people, my conclusion is that Near East Relief is good, and as your representative over here, I bespeak your continued interest and support of this great work.

Water Cause of Contempt Case

Argument before Judge J. C. Kendall on a charge citing C. S. Murphy, of Bridge, for contempt of court for not complying with a judgment handed down last May was continued in the judge's chambers at Marshfield Wednesday after a preliminary hearing Tuesday here.

Murphy is charged with the failure to comply with a judgment ordering him to furnish the Bridge school board with a certain specified amount of water from a spring which he controls under the terms of a contract made with the school board. The case is now before the supreme court on appeal.

In the argument Wednesday Murphy produced witnesses in an effort to prove that the well did not furnish the amount of water specified in the judgment. He also claims that water is being used from the spring without his consent and that he is unable to stop this use. The school board produced witnesses to testify that the Bridge school had been closed September 17 and 24 because of lack of water and that the amount specified was not being furnished. A difference in interpretation of the judgment and a technical difference over the status of the contempt case was the occasion of the argument Wednesday.—Times.

Salvation Army Building at Bay

I. S. Smith was unanimously elected president and Frances McLeod secretary of the permanent building committee for the Salvation Army home at a meeting of the committee held Tuesday noon at the Chandler hotel.

Plans and specifications for the new home were submitted and it was estimated that the cost would be little over the \$19,000 mark and after some discussion the committee set \$25,000 as the goal to be raised by subscription. Of this amount \$15,000 and including labor donations and material must be raised before work on the building will commence.

The proposed site for the home is at Fifth and Commercial streets.—News.

Airplane Lost in the Fog

One of the fleet of mail planes operated by the Pacific Air Transport company and piloted by Brookswalter lost its way in the dense fog last Friday, being the first mishap of any kind reported since the PAT line began operations.

The plane, a biplane, was loaded with mail but no passengers. Dense fog was immediately encountered and the pilot lost his bearings. His first sight of land that looked formidable for a landing place was at Powers, fully 100 miles off the course. The landing was effected with but slight damage and after waiting two hours the fog lifted and the pilot hopped off intending to stop at Roseburg unless the fog cleared.

Some trouble was experienced in starting the engine, which delayed its leaving Powers.—Coos Bay Harbor.

Coquille Lost, 13-0

"Brick" Leslie's Coquille High football team was beaten at Marshfield last Saturday afternoon, 13-0, but they played the sort of a game that cheered their supporters and brought praise from the coach.

That they could hold the heavier and more experienced Bay team to two touchdowns was remarkable. One of them was the result of a 35-yard pass to Shady, who received a forward pass from Chapman in the fourth quarter. Their other touchdown was in the second quarter when successive line bucks carried the ball across.

Neither goal was kicked, but one point was awarded when Coquille was offside during the try for goal. Coquille completed several forward passes and another was called incomplete, which spectators, right on top of the play, say was fairly caught, although the catcher fell.

One error of judgment in calling the proper play lost a possible touchdown for Coquille. With three downs to go and only ten yards to the goal line, Call signalled for a kick instead of attempting to buck or pass and the Marshfield goal line remained unscathed.

The game at Bandon with North Bend resulted in a 0-0 tie, while Myrtle Point, playing at Grants Pass, defeated the Josephine county team, 13-0.

Another Election Necessary

350 Bushels to the Acre

Over 350 bushels of cranberries to the acre is the bountiful yield reported by Herman Nabb of Hauser, owner of perhaps the best-cultivated cranberry ranch in Southern Oregon. Mr. Nabb has just begun harvesting this year's crop of berries and he states that his one and three-fourth acres will yield over 700 bushels of fine cranberries. The Nabb cranberry ranch is located about two miles from Hauser. There is a good market for the berries this year.

An unusually large yield of peaches is also reported by a north bay side rancher, John Stampos, of Kentuck Inlet. The latter has a tree grown from seed that is so loaded with peaches that the limbs are breaking. Two exceptionally large peaches from the tree are on display in the North Bend chamber of commerce office—Marshfield News.
