Institute Instructors Named

Instructors for the County Teach-
ers' Institute which will be held in
the Marshfield high school building
on November 23 and 24 are as fol-
lows: J. T. Mathews of Willamette

University, Beatrice Walton, of the
State Department of Education, A.
C. Strange, of the Southern Oregon

Normal School, T. A. Gentle, prin-
cipal of the Training School of the O-
regon Normal, Oma Bell Emmons, of

the Oregon Normal, Elizabeth Hen-
derson, supervisor of music in Klam-
ath county. Several of these speak-
ers are recommended as being ex-
ceptional for County Institute work.

Besides the speakers mentioned from
out of the county, several local peo-
ple will be used, among whom are

Supt. C. A. Howard, of Marshfield,
who will give one lecture and Sophie
Messenger, music teacher in Marsh-
field schools who will have charge of

assembly music.

During one period of the Institute,
Mr. Gentle will teach a model lesson,
using boys and girls of the Marshfield
public schools.

Another new phase will be the high
school round table discussion partici-
pated in by the teachers who will
be divided into sections according to
the courses which they teach. There
will be six such divisions. As this
is just an experiment as far as our
county is concerned only one period
will be devoted to it.

The instructors in the Home Econ-
omies and Industrial Arts depart-
ments are being requested to have
their rooms open for inspection and
be ready to discuss any matter which
the visiting teachers care to take up.

Cafeteria lunch will be served each
of the two days by the Home Econ-
omies department of the Marshfield
high school under the supervision of
Miss Ruth Dungan.

The teachers last year so enjoyed
the musical program which was ar-
ranged for by the Marshfield teach-
ers that they are asking the latter to
plan the evening program again. Sev-
eral of the instructors from out of the
county last year stated that the musi-
cal talent which was displayed was
unusual for a town the size of Marsh-
field.

H. K. Shirk, who is president of the
County Division of the Oregon State
Teachers' Association, is requesting
that all the dues for the teachers' as-
sociation be paid to the treasurer, Ruth Beyers, of Coquille,
so that the county can be reported as
being 100 per cent when the Institute
opens.

Looks Like Republican Year

Claims of sweeping republican victory
for the republican ticket in the
coming election were made yesterday
by Phil Metschan, chairman of the re-
publican state central committee. He
urged republicans of the state to con-
solidate their forces and support the
administration. A vote for the party
nominee, he said, was a vote cast in
support of the state's primary law.

The election of a democratic sena-
tor from Oregon, he said, would not
only be a slap at the president and the
national administration but it might
give the democratic party the slight
majority needed to organize the sen-
ate and thus deprive western republi-
can senators of their dominant posi-
tions of that body. He said:

"The sovereign people of Oregon will
vote next Tuesday whether they will
uphold President Coolidge and the re-
publican administration by giving
them a vote of confidence or they will
turn their backs upon them and sup-
port the party that has always
brought disaster to our national pros-
perity and distress to our people—
the democratic party.

"They will vote to support the di-
rect primary law of the state or they
will, by their decision, regard it mer-
ely as a scrap of paper. They will
maintain it by voting for candidates
nominated in accord with the law or
they will nullify it by following the
will of the wisp of an independent
candidate.

"I expect Steiwer, republican nomi-
nee for United States senator, to win
by a substantial plurality. Patterson,
for governor, will be elected by an
overwhelming vote. Oregon must not
lose its opportunity to elect an exec-
utive who will give the state a busi-
ness-like administration. His acts as
governor will not be influenced by
consideration of political expediency.

Claim Homestead Law Violation

For alleged violation of buying and
cutting timber from U. S. homesteads
located on Oregon and California land
grants, A. Johnson, U. S. Deputy
Marshal of Portland, was in Marsh-
field Wednesday and arrested John

C. Davies, Marshfield timber operator,
and Joseph Harry Druliner, Milton S.
Anthony, Burr Y. Druliner and Robert
A. Redell, of Myrtle Point.

The men were alleged to have filed
on homesteads and then proceeded to
log off the cedar timber without mak-
ing an effort to improve the land, as
the homestead act requires.

It appears that Davies, and Redell,
who is employed by the former, pur-
chased logs from Anthony and Joseph

and Burr Druliner, who have home-
steads on the Middle Fork, without
knowledge that it was a violation of
37 and 49, federal land code. Davies
posted \$2000 bail; Redell, \$2000; Jo-
seph Druliner, \$1000; Anthony, \$500
and Burr Druliner \$1000. The cases
will be up in federal court in Port-
land soon. They were indicted by the

federal grand jury in Portland.

Mr. Davies stated yesterday that he
believed that this a test case to de-
termine whether or not timber can be
sold from homesteads located on O.
and C. lands.—News.
