Who deals out the punishment these days at home and in the courts? the clubwoman asked. Why, the mothers and the women jurors, they replied.

"Men are just as sentimental as women, only they show it in different ways," opined Mrs. H. O. Peebles of the Philomusan club, in Philadelphia, and chairman of the program committee at the convention.

"Do you know, I believe men in the jury box are more sentimental than women, but they would never admit it in a thousand years," she added, dropping her voice to a confidential whisper. "I should think a guilty criminal would rather face a jury of men than one of women."

"It has always been bunk, any way, that women are the softer sex," she declared emphatically, warming into her subject. "Why, men are the softer sex. Honest, they won't even correct their children any more."

The other women nodded solemnly in agreement. They, too, had children and hair brushes and soft-hearted husbands, their nod implied.

"It seems to be the mother's job to punish the children nowadays," agreed Mrs. A. Haines Lippincott, Republican state committeewoman of Camden county and a delegate from the New Century club in Philadelphia.
